Miss Lucy A. Proctor, who was supervisor of music in the Barre schools for a year, has been appointed to a similar position in Yonkers, N. Y. Last year she was supervisor in the public schools of Brattleboro.

Before the enrollment for the fall term in the public schools of Barre is entirely completed, it is expected that the registration will compare favorably with almost any total of recent years. A canvass of the grades indicates that 1,900 children, or thereabouts, are enrolled and with nearly 450 high school students the aggregate is considered wholly encouraging. The total enrollment throughout the city is somewhat larger than the published enrollment of the public schools in Burlington and exceeds by a considerable margin the figures announced in Rutland. Prevalence in isolated sections of whooping cough has tended to keep the registration down for the time being.

Some of the seasoned material at Goddard seminary as well as a sprinkling of the fledgling stock registered on the hill-top for the first time this fall will be used by Coach Charlie Hoernle in a game with the Italian A. C. at Berlin street Saturday afternoon. The coach had his new men out for a practice on the diamond last night and expressed himself as being very much pleased with their showing. The Italian outfit has promised to have Pete Clemens of the Portland team as one of the attractions. Sunday's baseball card, according to the posters, will find the Hoernleites and Italians lined up at Intercity park in what will probably be the last baseball game of the 1916 season.

Goddard seminary's football team is to lose one of its mainstays for a time as a result of an accident which occurred Tuesday night, when William McIntosh of Winchendon, Mass., captain of the eleven, sustained a fracture of the collar bone on the right side. It was the first serious accident to happen on the hill-top through a drill inaugurated by Coach Hoernle and known as falling on the ball, an exercise often given football players early in the season. Dr. W. R. Harkness of Montpelier, himself a graduate of the seminary and a football enthusiast, happened to be on the campus when the captain was injured. He hurried onto the field and was instrumental in having the young fellow removed to the dormitory, where the fracture was reduced. McIntosh was able to be out of doors yesterday, but his injury will keep him out of the game for a month and perhaps longer. Coach Hoernle has several likely candidates for the captain's position in the back field.
