



## TO RECONSIDER DIVORCE CANON

The Episcopal Bishops Will Bring Matter Up Again

PROHIBITS REMARRIAGE

Proposition Was Defeated by Deputies at St. Louis Last Week

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 20.—The divorce question in the Protestant Episcopal church, general convention, which was killed in the House of Deputies last Saturday, may again be brought before the ruling bodies of the convention. It was learned yesterday that the House of Bishops, the "Senate" of the church legislative bodies, in secret session during the night, had practically decided to bring the question up again.

The proposed new canon which was defeated last week would prohibit the marriage of any person who has been a party to a divorce for any cause whatever. The present canon permits the marriage of the innocent party in a divorce case. The present law was ruled to remain for at least three more years by the deputies when the laymen in a body refused to concur with the clerical members and defeated the proposed canon after a two days' debate.

It was said the canon might be taken up by the bishops because the lower house had not officially notified the upper branch of its action last week. This would bring it up as unfinished business. It is thought the proposition will be voted on some time next week.

If the House of Bishops passes the resolution for a new canon, it will be sent back to the deputies for concurrence. Its fate in the lower house would be problematical, but some of the "pro" campaigners said they would have a better chance to get it through than they had last week.

The defeat of the question Saturday was attributed to the fiery speech of Rev. Dr. John Howard Melish of Brooklyn, who arraigned wealthy persons who, tiring of their mates, were divorced and remarried. He said he favored the canon if it would affect only these persons, but he opposed it because it would also prevent the re-marriage of women who had been abandoned by their husbands.

Brooklyn's Socialist priest could not be found yesterday, but some of his friends said he would undoubtedly again be lined up against the proposed canon.

### TO MAKE RESERVE OFFICERS.

How the Plan Will Work Out at the University of Vermont.

The reserve officers training corps, which is to be established at the University of Vermont and 15 other institutions in this country, will have as its object the creation of a body of men who would be competent to take command of the large citizen army which the United States would raise in case of war with a first-class power.

It aims to train these men with the least possible interference with their civil careers; in fact, to make it a course that will be highly beneficial to them in whatever else they undertake. To make membership in the reserve officers an asset to the man's character, the personnel will be carefully chosen. Military science will be required of all students during the freshman and sophomore years, as has been the case in the past; after this if the student desires and he is judged competent by the commandant he becomes a member of the reserve officers' training corps and continues his military course five hours per week for the rest of his college course. For this he will receive approximately \$90 a year and will be expected to attend one of the summer military camps for a month during the summer. Upon graduation those who are recommended by the commandant will receive appointments from the war department as reserve officers and may receive commissions as temporary second lieutenants in the regular army, receiving the pay of that rank as long as they serve.

At institutions where it seems feasible such special departments as machine gun, engineering and medical corps will be established. Thus the Vermont battalion will have attached to it regimental infantry and hospital corps. The equipment furnished by the national government will be much more complete than formerly. Instead of the old Krag rifles the new Springfield will be used and the rest of the men's outfit will be the same as that used by the regular army. To handle this the university's military department will be provided with an ordnance and quartermaster's office.


