HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

It is estimated that nearly a thousand in Burlington took Thanksgiving dinner away from home, the large proportion of them going to hotels and restaurants.

While confined in jail at Castleton for intoxication Richard Roberts burned all of his clothing except his union suit.

Elder Benjamin T. Wheeler, who is in his 88th year, hitched up his team and drove three miles to the Christian church in Calais and filled his appointment by preaching a sermon on Thanksgiving day.

The Orleans Trust company has purchased the Lawrence block in Newport for \$18,000. The company will raze the present structure and build in its place a modern brick block for the use of the bank.

Rev. George H. Miner of Worcester, Mass., aged 71 years, and Miss Jennie H. Crosby, aged 54, of Yarmouth, N. S., were married Friday evening in Brattleboro. This was Mr. Miner's third marriage.

Arch Craig of Peacham has a dog that three times recently has caught wild cats which no one could approach. He catches them by the tail and holds on with an iron grip, and in one case he threw the animals.

During the month of November 107 marriage licenses were issued by the Bellows Falls town clerk. This makes the number for the year 900, and it is likely no less than 1,000 will be the record before the year ends.

Cecil K. Hughes, a Saxtons River merchant, gave six ounces of his blood Dec. 2 in a transfusion operation to save the life of his three-year-old daughter, who had been weakened by hemorrhages of the stomach. The transfusion operation is working successfully on the child.

Starlings have made their appearance in Hartland. They are a species of birds not often seen in this vicinity, having been introduced into this country from Europe in New York City. They have been seen in Hanover, N. H. recently.

After being connected with the Newton & Thompson Manufacturing company in Brandon for over 50 years, L. J. Fortier, the senior member of the firm, has sold his interest in the business to Guy H. Bump. Mr. Fortier will withdraw from active business.

When Elias Andrews, a Bellows Falls knife sharpener, raised the price of sharpening from five cents to 10 cents, the housewives of that village began to reduce the cost of living by sharpening their own, and the stores have been besieged with women purchasing knife-grinding stones.

The Congregational church of Danville held its third every-member canvass Sunday afternoon, Dec. 3, and the result was far above expectation. One hundred and eighty-seven people pledged \$1,400 for current expenses, and 90 people pledged \$200 for church benevolence. At the close of the canvass the 28 canvassers were given supper.

It was 100 years ago last month that the Episcopal church at Windsor was instituted, for on Nov. 25, 1816, thirty persons were baptized and the church was organized. In April, 1819, the present church was started at a time when there were only 362 persons at that faith in Vermont, but it was not until Nov. 20, 1822, that the church was ready for use.

November Weather in Northfield. W. A. Shaw, meteorologist in charge of the Northfield station of the United States weather bureau, reports a mean temperature for November of 31 degrees, which is one degree below the normal November temperature in Northfield. The highest was 67 degrees, on the 9th, and the lowest was two degrees below zero, on the 17th. The greatest daily range was 36 degrees, on the 22d, and the least daily range was four degrees, on the 13th. The precipitation (rain and melted snow) amounted to 3.13 inches, the normal for the month being 2.60 inches of unmelting snow. The prevailing wind was from the south, the total movement 5,201 miles, the average hourly velocity 7.2 miles, and the maximum velocity 35 miles per hour, from the southwest on the 24th. The month was made up of three clear, nine partly cloudy and 18 cloudy days. Precipitation in quantity sufficient to measure occurred on the 6th, a lunar halo on the 4th and a solar halo on the 9th.
