HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

Miss Charlotte W. Stratton, who died Sunday at her home in Bennington, had reached the age of 92 years.

Middlebury college is to be represented at the winter sports carnival at Dartmouth college in Hanover N. H.

The coal situation in Burlington was improved for the present when, on Monday, 18 carloads, for which dealers had long been waiting, arrived.

The Rutland fire steamer was sent to Granville, N. Y., Monday to aid in fighting a blaze which destroyed two three-story houses, with a property loss of \$35,000.

Mr. and Mrs. W. Lawrence ("Larry") Gardner, recently married in Winthrop, Mass., are visiting the former's parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Gardner, in Enosburg Falls.

Clayton Kenyon was perhaps fatally injured in his barn in Hinesburg a few days ago when he fell from a big beam to the floor and onto a mowing machine. Three ribs and a leg were broken.

William Labarge of Burlington had for 48 years been bragging about the ability of his ears to stand the cold of winter uncovered, but they failed him last Saturday and were badly frost bitten.

A debt on the Baptist church in Rutland was liquidated by the subscriptions at the service last Sunday morning, when in about 40 minutes \$13,000 was pledged, which will be used to pay the debt and settle current expenses.

John A. Goss, aged 82 years, died recently at his home in Greensboro. For 50 years he had been a prominent resident of the town. He was the father of Mrs. W. P. Stafford, wife of Judge Stafford of Washington, D. C.

W. M. Emerson skated onto a thin piece of ice on Lake Champlain at Burlington Sunday and went under. After several minutes he was able to find ice that would bear his weight and saved himself. He will suffer no ill effects.

Albert C. Robinson of West Wardboro has this season shot six bears and 16 in all since he went into hunting as a business. He has shot a deer each year for 19 years, two bobcats and much small game. Mr. Robinson was at one time employed in the state hospital in Waterbury.

Alton, six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Wilder, died Saturday at the home of his parents in Cambridgeport, as the result of a fall the Wednesday before. He was playing with other children in the barn when he fell nine feet, fracturing his skull. At the hospital a piece of bone, which was pressing on the brain, was removed, but he lived only a few hours.

President John M. Thomas of Middlebury college, who accompanied the 1st Vermont regiment to the Mexican border as chaplain, gave an address before the men's club of the Middlebury Baptist church Monday evening, describing the trip and the life while there. He referred to the diminutive size of the expedition sent to Texas compared with the numbers that would be required should Germany and the United States engage in war.

Why Disease is Caused by Fear. An eminent medical authority once made the statement that a great deal of contagion is due largely to nervous apprehension and fear. FROZEN BODY ON FLOOR.

Matthew Geaney of Burlington Had Been Dead Two Days.

Burlington, Feb. 7.—Matthew Geaney was found dead yesterday morning at his home on Ledge road. Mr. Geaney lived alone in the little old house at the edge of the hill, so familiar to the hundreds of people that visit that section of the city.

Mr. Geaney was last seen by his neighbors on Saturday evening on his return from down street. As he often remained indoors for days at a time nothing was thought about his not being out.

Yesterday morning Joseph Greenough had an appointment with Mr. Geaney to repair the ceiling of a room in the house and he arrived at 9:30. He rapped on the door and, receiving no response, discovered that the door was unlocked, and entered. Mr. Geaney was found lying on the floor, face downward, near a rocking chair. He was fully dressed, excepting his coat, and had evidently fallen from the chair and rolled about on the floor.

Mr. Greenough went to the home of C. P. Cowles, a short distance away, and Mrs. Cowles, telephone chief of Police Russell, who notified Health Officer Ennis. These two immediately went to the Geaney house.

Dr. Ennis expressed an opinion that the man had been dead since Sunday night, and that death was caused by heart failure. The body was frozen stiff and was badly discolored.

Several pans and kettles on the stove were filled with ice, and, of course, there was no fire in the stove. Remnants of food were visible and there was plenty of water and coal on hand. A bundle of letters was found on the table near and several books that Mr. Geaney had evidently been reading. The small kerosene lamp was empty of oil.

The body after it had been examined by the officials, was removed to the undertaking rooms of Frank J. Dwyer, where it was prepared for burial.

Mr. Geaney was one of the oldest residents of Burlington. He was interested in his younger days in the oil business in Pennsylvania and the south. Returning to Burlington two years ago, after an absence of 35 years, he found his little house, left him by his father, still standing a picturesque landmark at the top of the hill. He found the road changed, sidewalks built and many other improvements that took him a long time to get accustomed to. He never tired of telling visitors of the old days of his boyhood and of the changes which 35 years made in Burlington as he found it upon his return.

During the absence in the oil fields the house on the hill was occupied by his six children, Mrs. Margaret Geaney. Mr. Geaney is survived by a widow and by several sons scattered up and down the country, who will be notified of the death as soon as they can be located.

PATENTS EXTENSION.

Granted in Mexico to Citizens of Belligerent Nations.

Mexico City, Feb. 7.—Because of difficulties imposed by the European war the government has extended the time in which patents trade marks and copyrights may be registered and protected in Mexico by citizens of belligerent nations. These citizens may register patents, trade marks and copyrights produced after July 31, 1914, at any time within six months after the ending of the European war without suffering loss of protection.

NO FRICTION

With Japan Anticipated Over the New Immigration Law.

Washington, Feb. 7.—It is stated authoritatively that there is a perfect understanding between the United States and Japan on the working of the new immigration law, passed by Congress over the president's veto, and that on neither side is there any apprehension of friction or difficulty.

A careful study of the law discloses no discrimination against Japanese and no provision for their exclusion from the United States.

FLIES FLEE FROM BLUE.

The Germ Laden Pests Either Fear or Hate That Color.

The Arabs have long known that flies fear or hate the color blue, and that is why the houses in many of their towns are calcimined in a light blue tint. Before the French Academy of Sciences recently Messrs. Galinie and Houlbert described the results of their observations on the eyesight of flies. The only light that these insects see really well is white; their eyes do not see indigo and blue and the vibrations of the blue and green rays are disagreeable to them, and red has the effect of darkness. Yellow alone of all the colored rays is tolerated as well as white.

The solar spectrum as seen by the eyes of a fly begins at green and ends at bright orange. The practical conclusion to be drawn from this is that when a room has blue window panes the flies therein become as inactive as if it were dark. If a slit of a blind be opened to let in a ray of white light the flies will rush toward it and go out through the blind.

In Japan they hang curtains made of beads of blue glass mixed with tubes of painted bamboo at the entrances to butchers' and pastry cooks' shops. These let the air in, and the flies go out through the interstices between the beads, but do not re-enter.—New York World.

Equine Pedometers.

The whorls of hair on the coats of horses and other animals are natural pedometers, inasmuch as they register the locomotive activities of the animals on whose bodies they are found. The best examples and the greatest number of these hairy whorls and crests are found on the domestic horse. A notable instance is the graceful feathering that extends along the hollow of the flank, dividing the trunk of the animal from the hind quarters. There are also crests and whorls on the horse's chest and other parts of its body. A study of the action of the underlying muscles explains the origin of these peculiarities in the lay of the hair and furnishes the justification for calling them pedometers, although the analogy is, of course, merely superficial.—St. Louis Republic.


