GERMAN RESERVISTS

50,000 of Them Leaving the United States for Mexico

EXODUS DURING THE LAST THIRTY DAYS

Took Place Under Orders Issued from Teuton Headquarters in Berlin

New York, March 6.—Approximately 50,000 Germans in the United States, who have been unable since the beginning of the war to get back to the fatherland to fight with the Teutonic allies, have left this country for Mexico during the last 30 days. Almost every one of these men is a German reservist. Each has left under orders and gone to a definite point in Mexico to report to a specified individual. The exodus has not been from New York City alone, but from the country over, where necessary, funds have been supplied the travelers from German sources. In other cases the reservists have realized on whatever assets they had before leaving the United States. There is a prominent German official who, from the background, is directing this movement. He has assumed much of the secret work that Ambassador Von Bernstorff had charge of here and which could not, for obvious reasons, be turned over to the Swiss minister, Dr. Paul Ritter. Every German reservist in this country has had in his possession a red card printed in German, and which he carried in his inside pocket. That card gave him instructions where to go and to whom to report in the event of receipt of instructions from some German authority that he would recognize. This card, it is understood, is a new one, issued during the past two months and one that superseded the usual card carried by every German reservist leaving the fatherland. These are facts that have come to light within the past 60 hours, unearthed by United States officials since the breaking off of diplomatic relations between the two countries. The official admission by Berlin of the authenticity of the note of Foreign Secretary Zimmermann to the German ambassador in Mexico is taken as further proof of the existence of a well organized plan to provide for the immediate transfer of German reservists from the United States to Mexican soil. The exodus of Germans has taken place by both boat and rail and although it has been in progress in a more or less desultory fashion for some months there has been a marked increase of southern travelers in the last month. Some few of these have gone to Cuba, but most of them had a town in one of the constitutional provinces of Mexico as his destination. This movement became so marked as to draw attention of United States officials on the border to conditions, which, upon investigation, were found to be confirmed in other sections of the country. Some Germans who have gone to Mexico freely stated their intention before leaving and declared that they were acting under German government instructions. By far the large majority simply left their accustomed haunts or places of employment saying nothing, and some few, who were in unusually good positions, simply explained that they "had to go to Mexico."

He said there was an unprecedented shortage not only in the United Kingdom but throughout the world.

THE EMERGENCY SHELF.

Simple Remedies That Should Be at Hand in Every Home.

Gasoline is a good disinfectant for the treatment of wounds in emergency cases. It is especially good if the wound is lacerated or if the skin was dirty when the wound was made. After washing the wound with gasoline paint with a tincture of iodine, using a small wad of absorbent cotton for the iodine "paint brush." Every family should have a supply of emergency remedies at hand, and a physician suggests this list for the home medicine shelf: Two ounce bottle of aromatic spirits of ammonia, a good stimulant in case of fainting—use as an inhalation or put one-half teaspoonful in one-quarter glass of water and give internally; eight ounces of gasoline, use freely to cleanse wounds; two ounces of tincture of iodine to paint wounds and kill germs; one yard sterile gauze; one yard fine oxide adhesive plaster, two inches wide; one yard zinc oxide adhesive plaster, one inch wide; one-fourth dozen sterile absorbent cotton; one-half dozen sterile bandages, assorted sizes; eight ounce bottle saturated boric acid solution to use as an antiseptic wet dressing for wounds and as an eye wash; eight ounce bottle peroxide of hydrogen, good for slight cuts and abrasions, but not to be relied on for serious wounds; one hot water bag; one fountain syringe; one ice bag.—Kansas City Star.

MOVE TO SHIFT INAUGURAL DATE

Last Wednesday and Thursday in April Is Now Suggested

MARCH 4TH IS USUALLY STORMY

The Constitution Must Be Amended to Make the Change

Washington, March 6.—Agitation for changing the date of the inauguration of presidents of the United States, which has been waged for the last 16 years, was never stronger than yesterday. Col. Robert N. Harper, chairman of the inaugural committee, and his associates declared their intention of taking definite steps immediately to enlist the aid of President Wilson and of Congress in bringing a change in the date.

BRILLIANT LIGHTING ENDED INAUGURATION

Washington Was a Blaze of Glory in Honor of the Inducting into Office of Another President of the United States.

Washington, D. C., March 6.—The glow of thousands of electric lights, bathing in brilliant illumination Washington's wide avenues and public buildings, the beams of many searchlights playing on the dome of the capitol, peace monument and the court of honor, and the artillery of a mammoth pyrotechnical display at the Washington monument grounds last night brought the inaugural festivities to a close. Pennsylvania avenue was a broad, bright line of yellow light, a mile-long colonnade set with illuminated courts at five points between the capitol and the White House. At each of these "courts of state," the avenue was bridged with festoons of glowing bulbs sweeping in graceful lines from tall pillars of white and intertwined with evergreens. All public buildings were ablaze with lights, and many of the larger private buildings also were aglow.

ECZEMA ALL OVER MOTHER'S BODY TO PREVENT ILLNESS.

That is One of the Objects of Compulsory Health Insurance. Compulsory health insurance is now being talked of as another step in community welfare, the course being especially recommended in welfare work among wage earners.

Investigation has shown that a large proportion of sickness is preventable, but most persons, small wage earners or not, are likely to neglect their ailments until prevention is no longer possible and serious illness must be treated. Even then the doctor's services are avoided as much as possible because of the cost, and the victim of disease goes back to his work before he is fit.

Under the compulsory insurance system it is the idea that every worker shall be visited at stated intervals by a physician whether he is ill or not; the slightest illness brings a call from the doctor, whose business is to keep him well if possible. In many cases he will succeed, with the result of a great saving of time and wages to the worker.

The total of such savings in the industrial centers will run into the millions and will proportionately lessen the demands on charitable funds.—Indianapolis Star.

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The white dome of the capitol stood out boldly, a silver patch against the sky. The famous Bartholdi fountain in the botanic garden was bathed in light, and the clear-cut lines of the peace monument seemed to have written into them the spirit of life by the long silver pencils of many searchlights.

At the Washington monument grounds, where a great crowd saw the fireworks display, the night was a riot of bursting shells and color. Peace and war scenes vivid for the ascendancy in the program, the bursting shells alternating with cascades of silver fire, waterfalls in the clouds, and splendid color fantasies portraying in vast gardens and blossoms.

"Spiderland" was represented by the simultaneous bursting, half a mile in the air, of 50 bombs, which spread a silver web against the sky, over which countless fiery insects crawled. Wheels of flame skidded from the earth into space, breaking into clusters of many-colored stars. Illuminated parachutes dropped from bursting bombs, floating gracefully into darkness and ashes.

"Wilson peace bombs," 18 15-inch shells, broke above the heads of the throng, showering thousands of stars, which turned alternately red, white and blue.

A spectacular feature was the reproduction in flame, 1,000 feet in the air, of a huge American flag, 500 feet long. The field of the Cloth of Gold, with its rapid-fire explosions, spread a yellow mantle, 1,200 feet long, over the heads of the crowd. A field bombardment, represented by the simultaneous discharge of 2,000 rockets, shot 50,000 colored stars into the sky.

Niagara falls, 100 feet high, was reproduced in silver fire, followed by "Sunset in the Alps," a gorgeous color study against a background of snow-clad peaks.

The Southern Cross, in flaming glory, lit the heavens, pyrotechnic searchlight playing its lights upon it as it melted into darkness. Sixteen electrical fountains, spouting fire, were portrayed simultaneously, followed by a mammoth bouquet of roses, painted in changing colors.

The entire city, at one stage of the program, was lighted by the bursting of hundreds of large bombs, fired a mile into the air.

One of the chief set pieces was the mammoth reproduction, in fire, of the faces of the president and vice-president, framed in a laurel wreath and flanked on each side with columns, with "Wilson and Marshall" written in white letters at the bottom. This feature covered 3,000 square feet. It was followed by the reproduction of a brisk engagement on the firing line—the work of 12-inch and 18-inch pyrotechnical shells combining the rattle of machine guns, the roar of heavy cannon and the smoke of battle.

The inaugural bouquet followed, a mammoth reproduction of flowers, then the last number of the program, the firing of 750 nine and 12-inch shells which, bursting into streamers and stars, reflected all the colors of the rainbow.

"Good Night," in red, white and blue, brought the program and the festivities to a close.

President Wilson and invited guests viewed the display from the White House. It was nearing midnight when the long program ended, the lights on Pennsylvania avenue flickered out one by one, the throng dispersed, and the festivities attendant upon the second inauguration of Woodrow Wilson were over.

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BIRDLAND DANCE HALLS.

Playhouses and Gardens of the Australian Bower Birds.

There are several species of bower birds, chief among them the Satin and the Newton. The Satin bower bird is the best known. When the bowers were first discovered it was supposed that they were playhouses built by the native children, but as a matter of fact they are the dance halls of birdland.

The nests are built in the trees and have no connection with the playhouses. The male birds build these latter and gather every bright and shining object they can find to adorn the entrance to the bower. When it is completed, according to one who has watched them, little "at homes" are given daily, at which the males meet and pay their court to their ladyloves, now bowing and scraping, now playing hide and seek through the bower and now doing an absurdly dignified dance for their edification.

Newton's bower bird decorates its bower with fresh flowers every day, and if a visiting male bird wants to fight all he has to do is to disturb one of these flowers. The master of the bower proceeds with the painful duty of teaching him how to behave in company, while the remainder of the party raise a great racket, but never interfere. A naturalist studying them disarranged one of their flowers, but each time he did it the bower master rearranged it with great care.—National Geographic Magazine.
