J. B. Smith, who died in Boston Friday of heart disease, was a brother of Hiram G. Smith of Wells River. He had been connected with the New England house in Boston for 32 years.

This summer will be the 74th that E. B. Rockwell has spent in transportation service on Lake Champlain, having commenced at the age of 14. He celebrated his 87th birthday last month.

Miss Helen E. Kimball, who was physical instructor for girls in the Brattleboro schools, requiring only a part of her time, has taken a similar position in the schools of Crown Point, N. Y., which will require her whole time.

READY TO BUILD FACTORY. Chocolate Manufacturing Concern in Burlington Organizes.

Burlington, March 14.—The incorporators of the Vermont Milk Chocolate Co. met yesterday at the roof garden of Hotel Vermont and organized by electing the following directors: Fred H. Roberts, John Walker, Clarence P. Johnson, W. H. Cole and John E. Hayes of Boston and John J. Flynn and M. J. Barnes of Burlington.

The directors at a meeting immediately afterward elected Mr. Walker president; C. P. Edwards of Boston, vice-president; Mr. Barnes, treasurer, and William T. Scofield of Burlington, clerk and assistant treasurer.

The directors have full powers under the by-laws adopted yesterday to go ahead and make contracts and to conduct business from now on. Bids for the construction of a factory building on the site, south of the Champlain school purchased by John J. Flynn, will be let within a few days and work will be pushed to completion as fast as possible, so that operations may be started by summer.

Mr. Edwards will come up from Boston on Monday and with the board of directors will superintend the details of preliminary work necessary. Mr. Edwards will be the managing superintendent of the Burlington concern.

The meeting of the incorporators was called to order by Mr. Hayes, who was chosen temporary chairman. Mr. Johnson was elected clerk.

The chairman read the proposed by-laws, which had been prepared to conform with the laws of Vermont, under which the incorporation was formed.

These were accepted and the board proceeded to elect seven directors, as named. W. T. Scofield was chosen to be clerk of the corporation.

All of the \$200,000 preferred stock of the corporation has been taken by Burlington men and an additional amount of \$100,000 treasury stock will be placed on the market for subscriptions here.
