Barre local, international brotherhood of teamsters, chauffeurs, stablemen and helpers, has elected the following officers for the ensuing period of six months, the names given below supplementing the report in yesterday's Times of the hydrant tests and the beginning, made yesterday, indicates that very little trouble is to be encountered in getting the apparatus in working order after the winter. Of the 25 hydrants opened and flushed yesterday none was frozen and the fixtures in every instance were found to be in good working order. The deep snow is regarded as a factor in preventing the hydrants from freezing and with the observations of yesterday fresh in mind, the hydrant testers will be surprised if it develops that any of the apparatus has been affected by the cold.

Fair progress is being made by the ward workers who are assisting the assessors in taking the military census of Barre and thus far nearly 400 names have been received, although much of the data remains to be tabulated by the assessing board. There are 12 canvassers and since the first of the week some sections of the city have been pretty well covered, although much of the ground has not been trodden as yet. Returns are made in the assessors' office at city hall every morning before the canvassers start out on the trail. The governor has asked that the census be completed by April 1, if possible, and it is possible that the work here in Barre will be completed at the end of next week.
