

CAN'T CONTROL PRICE OF GOODS

Supreme Court Decision in Patents Case Handed Down Yesterday

VICTOR TALKING MACHINE CO. INVOLVED

Other Case That of Moving-Picture Firm—Mimeograph Verdict Upset

Washington, April 10.—Determining the important question regarding control by patentees of retail prices of their products, the supreme court yesterday pronounced unlawful the "limited license" plan under which the Victor Talking Machine company and many other products are distributed.

In another similar patent infringement suit of the Motion Picture Patents company against the Universal Film Manufacturing company and others the court held invalid restrictions of the patents company upon the use of competitors' films in its projecting machines. The court held that patent grants for machines give others the right to use them, subject to the patent right, with "any appropriate material or supplies." This overturns the court's decision in the Dick mimeograph case. The court did not decide legality of the Victor plan of limited distribution solely through "licensed" dealers.

Justices McKenna, Holmes and Vandewater dissented from the decisions in the Victor case. The Victor license plan was held to be mere price fixing, "which would work injustice" to the purchasing public and designated to avoid the court's previous decisions. Justice Clarke announced for the majority that the Dick mimeograph decision, which greatly extended the so-called patent "monopoly" of patentees, was overruled. The new decision greatly restricts rights of patentees to fix prices of their products or restrict the use of unpatented articles with patented machines. The new Clayton act was the ground given by the majority for overturning the Dick mimeograph case and thus circumscribing the monopoly of patents.

BRITISH SHIP SINKS U-BOAT AFTER FIGHT

Tanker and Submarine Battle 20 Minutes Off the Cornish Coast.

San Francisco, April 10.—The sinking of a German submarine off the Cornish coast by the British tank steamer Sequoia was revealed yesterday when the Sequoia arrived here from England. The submarine was destroyed after a 20-minute battle during which one man on the Sequoia was killed, three were wounded and the bridge and wheelhouse were carried away by shell-fire from the submarine.

Finally a well placed shell from the Sequoia struck the diver, which sank amid a burst of flame and smoke.

PLAN FOR \$5,000,000,000 LOAN.

Advertisers Say That They Could Raise It in a Week.

Chicago, April 10.—The national advertising advisory board has submitted to Secretary McAdoo a plan to raise by advertisement a loan of \$5,000,000,000 for the government in a week. It would be advertised as the "Old Glory loan." The board believes the loan can be floated at 3 per cent instead of 3½ per cent, a saving of \$25,000,000 a year.

This committee feels the importance of increasing the production of the state during the present crisis and with the co-operation of the board of education desires to enlist your efforts along the lines herein suggested. We beg that you present this appeal to the people and boys and girls of your community and adopt any plan that may seem feasible for carrying out our proposals.

2. We desire that they give their first attention to the raising of potatoes and beans and after that to other vegetables.
3. We urge the girls of the state to undertake the task of canning vegetables and fruit.
4. In recognition of these services the committee will give to each boy and girl who succeeds in doing meritorious work a certificate bearing the state seal and the signature of the governor and commissioner of education.
5. The committee will furnish seeds to such volunteers as are unable to procure seeds for themselves.

This is important work and needs to be attended to without delay. It will be one of the most patriotic services that can be rendered and will also release much food for the children of Belgium, Serbia, France and other suffering countries now allied with the United States of America. 

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
