The Weather

Partly cloudy to-night and Thursday; warmer in the interior; fresh west winds.

TALK OF THE TOWN

P. Fournier, who has been employed in Worcester, Mass., during the past few weeks, moved his household goods to Worcester to-day. County Agent F. H. Abbott of Patterson street left this afternoon for Burlington, where he will spend to-morrow and Friday attending the conference of county agents of Vermont to listen to lectures on the spring farm work and plans to be put into operation throughout the state by the county agent leader of the state.

Assessors are not making rapid progress in the matter of filing inventories, although less than 10 days elapse before the time expires for receiving declarations from poll taxpayers and property owners. A member of the board stated this morning that every citizen in the city has been furnished with a notice to appear at the office. Thus far, however, the response has been comparatively small and the assessors are wondering whether they will be compelled to invoke a law which provides a penalty for delinquencies of this kind. Inventories may be properly filed before April 20 and the suggestion is made that citizens make returns at city hall at once to avoid the 11th-hour rush.

Although authorities in other cities have been asked to aid the eastern military department in the work of dismantling private radio stations, the police in Barre have not received the word as yet and nothing has been done thus far in taking down the apparatus which surmounts several households hereabouts. In St. Albans and Montpelier the chiefs of police have been instructed to notify owners of wireless apparatus to discontinue stations. In instances where operators have held government licenses exceptions have been made. Here a number of ambitious young men have succeeded in establishing communication in recent years and some very encouraging results have been obtained. So far as inquiry indicates, none of the amateurs hereabouts hold federal licenses to operate and if the rule becomes general their stations will have to be dismantled.
