Bennington blacksmiths raised the price of horseshoeing May 1.

Five hundred and fifty women registered at the rest room in St. Albans during the month of April.

Mrs. H. C. Glidden of East Franklin has made from 12 trees 41 quarts of syrup and three pounds of sugar.

Stephen Billings recently caught in the White river at Sharon a brook trout that weighed two and one-half pounds.

Richford's third annual Choral union concert, under the leadership of Rev. E. M. Fuller, was held Tuesday evening.

Mrs. Walter Wilson and her infant daughter died April 23 at their home in Sherburne and Mr. Wilson died nine weeks before.

Warren Spaulding of Bridport, who was kicked by a horse a few days ago, died in a Ticonderoga, N. Y., hospital from the effects.

The daylight saving scheme in Danville is to be tried out first by the schools, which will open at 8 a. m. and close at 3 p. m.

Band concerts are to be taboed in Brattleboro this summer and the \$500 usually appropriated for the purpose will be used for Red Cross work instead.

Mrs. Julia Haskins Casey is very ill at her home in Underhill Centre with smallpox, supposedly contracted while on her way home from Boston a few weeks ago.

Someone broke into the powder house of the Barney Marble Co. at Roxbury Saturday morning while the guard was home for breakfast. The guard has now been doubled.

Mrs. Thornley S. Smith, wife of the pastor of the Methodist church at West Berkshire, died April 30 at the St. Albans hospital after an operation. She was about 60 years of age.

Miss Bertha Lee of East St. Johnsbury has 500 spring chickens nearly large enough for broilers and has 200 hens from which she gets from 150 to 200 eggs daily. The eggs are shipped to private parties in New York.

The Vergennes city council has decided not to oil the streets of that city this season, finding that the expense would be between \$1,200 and \$1,300 for two dressings, while the cost of operating the water sprinkler would be about \$500.

Bricklayers on a building job in Brattleboro struck recently, asking for an increase from 65 to 70 cents an hour on account of the high cost of living. Their places were filled at once by men from Springfield, Mass.

Theft has become quite general in the last few days in Burlington. Shoes and rubber boots were stolen from the store of Boynton & Cram Tuesday night and Meador Martin of the same city reported to the police that his house had been broken into and \$18 in cash taken.

April Weather

W. A. Shaw, meteorologist in charge of the Northfield station of the United States weather bureau, reports a mean temperature for April of 37 degrees, which is three degrees below the normal temperature for the month in Northfield. The highest was 64 degrees, on the 22nd, and the lowest was 15 degrees, on the 10th. The greatest daily range was 31 degrees, on the 25th, and the least daily range was three degrees, on the 22nd. The precipitation (rain and melted snow) amounted to 2.05 inches, the normal precipitation for the month being 2.09 inches. The prevailing wind was from the south, the total movement 6,287 miles, and the maximum velocity 42 miles per hour, from the north, on the 10th. The month was made up of four clear days. Precipitation in quantity sufficient to measure occurred on 12 days, and the total amount included 1.6 inches of snow. A thunder storm occurred on the 21st.
