HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

Marion and Dorothy Starty of South Londonderry, aged 8 and 10 years, earned a dollar to join the Red Cross by selling rhubarb.

Mrs. C. L. Woodbury, wife of C. L. Woodbury, proprietor of the South Royalton house, died June 19 of meningitis and a complication of diseases.

The three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Cummings of South Londonderry was badly burned recently when he fell into a pail of hot water. He will recover.

William Tracy, who was kicked in the face by a horse at his home in Hinesburg recently, is not recovering and has been taken home from the hospital in a critical condition. The wound in his face is healing, but brain trouble due to the shock is wearing him out.

To Mr. and Mrs. Walter Harlow, whose buildings in Westminster West were destroyed by fire recently, Maple Grove grange of that place has presented \$30.20, the proceeds of a recent play and dance, as a nucleus of a building fund, to erect a new dwelling and barns.

Mrs. Patrick Calvey attempted to commit suicide near her home in Bellows Falls Tuesday by jumping into the canal. Worry over her son, an employe in a Washington, D. C. hospital, it is said, drove her to the act. She was rescued by her husband and, although taken to the Rockingham hospital and suffering from the exposure, will recover.

It is thought in Brattleboro that the Timothy O'Donnell, in charge of the crew of 13 gunners on the Standard Oil company's steamer, the John D. Archbold, sunk by a German submarine Saturday, was a Brattleboro boy. The O'Donnell of that place served in the Spanish-American war and was a gunner in the navy, and it is supposed that he had been assigned to the tanker.

Stowe, Morrisville and nearby places suffered much Wednesday from a severe electrical storm. In Morrisville the roads were washed out and made impassable in some places. Lightning struck the barn of Sheriff George E. Towne, killing a horse and tearing out the gable and much of the boarding. Lightning also struck the telephone wires leading to his house five times, putting the instruments out of commission. At Lewis Lathrop's farm in Stowe, hail broke out 14 paces of glass from his henhouse and three acres of corn must be replanted.

A buck deer, which escaped from the corral at the Soldiers' home three weeks ago, was captured at the farm of Allen Stratton in Bennington June 20. The deer put up a stiff fight and the two game wardens who took upon themselves the job of catching the animal were considerably tossed about. The deer had been doing much damage in gardens about the Stratton farm and Mr. Stratton finally conceived the idea of trying a string to the barn door and then catching the animal if it should enter the barn. The deer did just that, the door was drawn together and the buck was a prisoner. It was crazy with fright when the game wardens arrived, but after half an hour's work it was thrown, tied and loaded into an automobile to be returned to its corral.

M. Baker, Wealthy Baker, Daniel W. Twitchell, Lura Twitchell, A. S. Warner, Arabella J. Purchase and L. J. Gorham. This purchase privileges the company to raise the dam 15 feet above the present level, which would cause the water to set back nearly to the Huntington Falls plant.

DEER SLAUGHTER JUSTIFIED. Brattleboro Man Killed Two Animals in His Orchard. Brattleboro, June 23.—Dana H. Stafford of Guilford street and who was killed yesterday a buck and a doe that were browsing on young fruit trees in his orchard. He reported the case to Game Warden E. H. Metcalf who investigated and pronounced the slaughter entirely justified, giving Mr. Stafford a certificate to that effect and the right to make use of the meat.

Mr. Stafford and a hired man were near the orchard when they saw the two deer browsing on the trees. Mr. Stafford left his employe to watch the animals while he went to the house and got his gun. The deer were enjoying their lunch when he returned and he shot first one and then the other.

Mr. Stafford said that over 20 young trees had been tested by the animals and materially damaged.

SUES FOR \$60,000.

Claims Ex-Gov. Mead Did Not Pay Commission on Sale of Plant.

Rutland, June 22.—Ex-Gov. John A. Mead, president of the Howe Scale company of this city, has been sued for \$60,000 by Randolph Coleman of Springfield, O., for alleged services performed by him when in the employ of Dr. Mead.

The action was brought yesterday afternoon by Attorneys J. C. Jones and E. H. O'Brien of this city, who represent Mr. Coleman.

It is alleged that on February 25, 1916, the plaintiff and defendant entered into a certain agreement whereby the plaintiff was to undertake to sell and dispose of the defendant's stock and interest in the Howe Scale company of this city. The price for the sale was not to be less than \$74,000 and it is claimed the defendant then agreed to pay the plaintiff a certain per cent for services in selling the stock. The commission price was set at five per cent.

The plaintiff undertook the sale and sold the stock to and through McBees, Jones and company, a brokerage firm in New York, for the price of \$87,500, and \$250,000 in stock of the common stock of the new corporation organized for the taking over of the Howe Scale company. The defendant received the money and the interest in the Howe Scale company, it is alleged through the diligence and work of Mr. Coleman, and though often requested, the defendant has not paid him for his services and refuses to do so.

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FEW WILFUL FAILURES. To Register in Vermont, Reports District Attorney Bullard.

Burlington, June 22.—Warrants for at least one man in Burlington, who failed to register under the selective draft law, and for several others throughout Vermont will probably be issued by United States District Attorney V. A. Bullard within a few days. Mr. Bullard has investigated a large number of cases and found that in most instances there had been no violation of the law.

There were several cases, however, where the failure to register was wilful and in these instances prosecutions will be commenced.

County clerks throughout the state are now returning to Mr. Bullard the names of persons who have registered since June 5 and, while the fact of late registration is no defense for a violation of the law, the causes of the delays will be taken into consideration in determining what disposition will be made of these cases. The delinquent ones in many cases are foreigners, who cannot read English and whose friends had not told them in time about the selective draft law.

Burlington, June 22.—Injuries to her head, one hip and a hand were received about 8:30 o'clock last evening by Miss Agnes Wheeler, a nurse at the Home for Destitute Children on the Shelburne road, when she was struck by an Empire touring car owned and driven by William Fenwick of Shelburne, as she was walking near the home, where she was assisted to the home, where she was attended by Dr. B. D. Adams.

The accident occurred on the bridge above Potash brook. Mr. Fenwick, who was coming to Burlington, claims that he did not see Miss Wheeler, who was walking in the same direction that the automobile was traveling, until too late to avoid striking her. The headlights of an automobile which was traveled towards Shelburne and which reached the bridge just as Mr. Fenwick's car arrived there, may have added to the troubles of the driver of the latter car.
