A petition in bankruptcy has been filed by William L. Town of Poultry, a contractor. He owes \$10,154 and has assets of \$2,514 of which \$925 is claimed exempt.

Rev. F. H. Leavitt last Sunday resigned the pastorate of the church in South Vernon, after nearly four years' work there. He has been asked to reconsider his decision.

Antoine Shorkey's premises in West Ferrisburg have been somewhat depleted recently by thieves, who on one occasion stole two bushels of seed corn, half a bushel of popcorn and half a bushel of grass seed, and on another occasion 13 hens and a rooster.

Butter Prints Bring 42 1/2 @ 43c - Eggs 33 @ 40c.

40 CATTLE A WEEK

Are Consumed By the Soldiers at Fort Ethan Allen.

Burlington, June 27.—It takes an average of 40 head of cattle per week to keep the men at Fort Ethan Allen in beef in addition to all the other articles which are shipped up there and it doesn't take the 6,000 soldiers long to eat up what would be a good sized train. The 40 head of cattle average about 525 pounds of beef to a cow so that the total of beef consumed in a week is about 10 tons.

In addition to the beef, the wholesale places in this city are supplying enormous quantities of other foods. Wilson and Company supply the beef and in addition to that send up an average of about 250 pounds of butter per week, 400 pounds of cheese, 1,500 dozen of eggs, and 1,000 pounds of butter.

Swift and Company do a big business in eggs, liver, pork and other meat products and it is conservatively estimated that they ship about five tons of meat per week to the Post and an enormous amount of eggs.

Armour and Company are also in the business of supplying the Post and their shipments yesterday included 250 pounds of butter. They average to send 200 pounds of link sausage and frankfurters out per week and also send out 10 cases of grapefruit per week.

Taking everything into consideration, it easily takes 20 tons per week for the men, about a ton and a half of butter and about half a ton of cheese, quite a few thousand eggs and no one knows how many tons of potatoes and other vegetables.

HER HUSBAND MISSING.

Burlington Woman Fears Curtis S. Smith May Have Been Drowned.

Burlington, June 27.—Mrs. Mary C. Smith of 25 South Champlain street appeared at the police station yesterday afternoon and inquired if she could obtain any information as to the whereabouts of her husband who left home four months ago and has not been seen since. She is of the opinion that he may be the man whose body was found on the shore of Malletts bay a few weeks ago.

According to the story told by Mrs. Smith her husband, whose name was Curtis S. Smith, left the home following a few words which resulted from his drinking. He had often left in a rage like that before and sometimes would stay away a week or two. Therefore Mrs. Smith thought nothing of the matter. On former occasions he always wrote some of the children, so she knew where he was.

Since his departure four months ago, however, she has received no inkling as to his whereabouts. When he disappeared he wore a black overcoat and soft hat. He is about five feet 10 inches tall and weighs about 180 pounds. He had a heavy sandy mustache. He was a laborer. In many respects he answers the description of the man found upon the beach.

BEEF CATTLE LOWER.

Dressed Hogs Are Unchanged and Fancy Calves Are Lower. Brighton, Mass., June 27.—At the Brighton live stock market yesterday morning, all beef prices were materially lower, and calves broke 1 @ 2c, but hogs were fully sustained at last week's figures.

Fancy cows and heifers sold at 9 1/2c, with average tops at 8 1/2 @ 9c, good cows at 7 @ 8c, ordinary cows at 6 @ 7c, and canner cows at 5 @ 6 1/2c. Fancy bulls brought 8 1/2 @ 8 3/4c and upward, with average bulls at 6 1/2 @ 7 1/2c and bologna bulls at 5 1/2 @ 6 1/2c.

Fancy calves broke about a cent a pound, lower grades selling at least 2c cheaper than a week ago. Fancy calves sold up to 14 @ 15c for small lots, with bunch lots at 12 @ 13c, fair lots at 10 @ 11c, and grassers and drinkers at 8 @ 10c. Sheep and lamb prices were nominal, offerings being too small to establish quotations.

Hogs were steady and unchanged in price, though markets West have been a little uncertain during the past day or two. Best hogs sold yesterday at 15 1/2 @ 16.30c, with rough lots at 15 1/2 @ 15 3/4c. Milk cows continue dull for ordinary milkers and prices are a little lower on the inside. Ordinary cows are selling at \$40 @ \$45, and from this up to \$100 with occasionally more for fancy milkers.

Dressed hogs are unchanged in price, western markets being steady to firm, with the local packers quoting 20 @ 20 1/2c, the same as a week ago.
