

MUCH EVIDENCE WAS SECURED

Mass of Documents Seized at I. W. W. Headquarters

PROSECUTIONS MADE IF WARRANTED

Raids Were Part of Plan to Suppress Sedition

Washington, Sept. 7.—Nation-wide seizure by the government of documents of the Industrial Workers of the World was said yesterday to be but one step in the vigorous campaign which the department of justice is prepared to conduct against disloyalty and sedition wherever they may show themselves.

While the I. W. W. is perhaps the largest single organization which will engage the department's attention in the campaign, from now on other organizations and individuals whose utterances and activities have given ground for suspicion of disloyalty will be under stricter surveillance than ever and more drastic measures will be pursued in dealing with them.

Included in the classes of persons with whom the department soon may deal are the so-called soap box orators of New York and other large cities; writers and publishers, in a few instances connected with the German language press in this country, so-called conscientious objectors and a large number of individuals not classified among the foregoing, whose activities have led them to be regarded as the active friends of Germany in this country.

For months the government has been collecting a tremendous amount of evidence which can be utilized in prosecutions contemplated in the near future.

Telegraphic reports from all sections of the country were received by the department yesterday, telling the results of Wednesday's raid.

A great mass of documentary matter was obtained, and all of this will be gone over carefully by local United States attorneys with a view to determining the truth of charges against persons identified with the organizations against whom heretofore there had been no actual proof.

To curb the activity of citizens and others suspected of disloyal and seditious utterances and activities, the department has increased its force of field workers and the forces at the disposal of federal marshals and attorneys in the chief cities.

BOMB IN I. W. W. OFFICE.

Federal Officials Preparing to Make New Arrests.

Detroit, Sept. 7.—A bomb was found among the material confiscated in the raid on the I. W. W. headquarters here Wednesday. Federal officials are preparing to make arrests in connection with the discovery. The arrests will be made to-day.

AWARDED \$112.50 FOR DEER DAMAGE

A. J. Hildreth's Claim for Loss of 25 Bushels of Beans Allowed at \$4.50 Per Bushel.

Brattleboro, Sept. 7.—County Warden E. H. Metcalf and Selectman W. E. Stelman visited the farm of A. J. Hildreth on the Putney road yesterday to determine the damage done to a field of yellow eye beans by deer. Mr. Hildreth planted nearly two acres of beans this spring, but the deer found them so appetizing that there was not enough of the crop left to be worth harvesting. He put in a claim for the equivalent of 25 bushels and Messrs. Metcalf and Stelman have decided to award him damage for that amount at the rate of \$4.50 a bushel. From this will be deducted the value of the carcasses of two small deer which Mr. Hildreth shot, this amount being estimated at \$15. This will leave him a net sum of \$97.50.
