HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

Forty cases are set for hearing at the October term of Vermont supreme court.

Sixty more registrants have been called in Chittenden county, making a total of 180 examined.

Hereafter all recruits received for the navy at the Burlington station will be sent to Norfolk, Va., instead of Newport, R. I.

A Chittenden county jury in the case of Charles Smith vs. Frank Wood found that the plaintiff had been slandered \$83 worth.

Fred J. Sullivan, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Sullivan of Rutland, has been commissioned second lieutenant in the signal corps.

From the sovereign grand lodge of inspectors, Frank L. Clark, a Rutland man, recently received word of his election as a 33d degree Mason.

Using a 22-calibre rifle, some Rutland youths were using a barn door as a target just as a man emerged from the barn, a bullet flying within a few inches of him.

Children placed stones on the street car track in Rutland to see the dust fly when the cars hit them. The result was that one car was derailed, but no one was hurt.

One hundred U. S. signal corps men are to be trained at the University of Vermont under direction of Lieut. Weston of the U. S. signal corps and Prof. Votey and Freedman of the university faculty.

Admiral Charles E. Clarke has sent word that he may soon make his annual visit to the Lake Mansfield Trout club in Stowe. The club is to keep its doors open some time longer despite reports to the contrary.

Adelbert Hart of Tinmouth left his automobile standing in the street in Rutland Friday and reported to the police that it had been stolen. Half an hour later the car was found on Merchants' row, where it probably had been left by its owner. Mr. Hart probably forgot where he left the machine.

Charles Murray, formerly of Wallingford, was escorted to Rutland Friday and made to register for the army. Murray says that on June 5 he tried to register but was not given any assistance by the board where he applied, and he let the matter drop. Murray is under a suspended sentence of two years for non-support of his wife and two children and only recently returned to his old home.

A family consisting of parents and two small children was found in Rutland last week living in a room absolutely without furniture, with no fuel and almost nothing to eat. The woman is soon to need the services of a physician. She and her two children have been sleeping on the floor with no protection under them and no coverings. Neighbors have given them food. The husband and father has been out of work until a few days ago. The case was brought to the city's attention by the Salvation Army.

George De Wolf Deans, an agent for the New York Central railroad, who died in a Burlington sanitarium on July 26, left "the sum of \$20 and no more" for his wife, Gertrude F. Deans, stipulating that the bequest be paid 60 days after his death. To his "faithful friend and stenographer," Margaret Dorothea Klingel, he willed \$1,000 and a large diamond ring, and to his "devoted, loved friend and nurse," Mary Susan Hill, who also was named as executrix, he left the residue of his estate. The man asked that his remains be cremated and placed in a silver jar, the value of which is not to exceed \$100.

WHEATLESS IDEA GROWING.

Vermont People Said to be Receiving the Idea Well.

Springfield, Sept. 24.—Judging from reports that are being received at the headquarters of the Vermont food administrator, James Hartness, the people of the state have received in excellent spirit the request that two "no white bread" days, Wednesday and Thursday of each week be observed until further notice.

Absolutely no complaint has been received, while on the other hand pledges of co-operation from all parts of the state have come in. At bottom of the menu card: "We are asked to conserve our country's food resources. On Wednesdays and Thursdays there will be no food prepared from wheat flour served in this hotel."

Another hotel man writes that he anticipates the fullest co-operation from his patrons, saying that many desirable substitutes, such as corn bread, oatmeal bread, nut bread, rye rolls, muffins, etc., can easily take the place of white bread on the days requested.
