HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

The Catholic church and Leon Busby's residence in Grand Isle were struck by lightning during last Wednesday's storm.

A new bridge is to be erected in Fair Haven over the Castleton river, to cost \$11,700. It will be built of concrete, reinforced with steel.

In Springfield, the King's Daughters have voted, in view of the fact that there are so many calls for Red Cross work, to omit this year their regular fair and supper.

A child born recently to Mrs. Gertrude Hopkins of Argyle, N. Y., who formerly lived in Hydeville, is said to have weighed but four pounds at birth and at the end of seven weeks weighed 13 1/2 pounds and had two teeth.

Howard Holsington of Springfield, charged with robbing his roommate, John Williams, of \$20 in Bellows Falls in August, was sentenced recently to not more than five nor less than six months in the house of correction at Rutland.

The Brattleboro Red Cross branch has been having a display of its work and among the articles is an afghan knitted from odds and ends of yarn by the school children of the place and another made by a Brattleboro woman 84 years old.

Roderick J. Filion and Louis Dunleavy, both of Brattleboro, were arrested at Camp Bartlett, Westfield, Mass., Friday on a charge of drunkenness and furnishing liquor to soldiers. Each was sentenced in court to 60 days in the house of correction at Springfield, Mass.

Burlington's school garden exhibition Saturday was a great success. A ton or more of squash, raised by the children, was sold by the pound during the exhibition. One exhibited that attracted attention was a fine stalk of peanuts grown and harvested by Lawrence Cowles of Ledge road. Two boys raised squashes that weighed 25 pounds each.

Miss Ruth Buzzell, a talented musician and cornetist of Springfield, who has just completed a 14 weeks' tour with the Mikado orchestra of girls through a Chautauque circuit, expects to go to Alaska this winter with a six-piece orchestra, known as the Pilgrim girls. They will serve under a lyceum bureau.

Richard J. Kenney, a contractor and builder in Springfield since 1868, died there Sunday following the amputation of his left leg to relieve trouble due to hardening of the arteries. He was born in Springfield in April, 1842, and during his active years built several dwellings and business blocks in that place. He had made two trips abroad, the last time being to witness the coronation of King George.

B. D. Piper, while motoring in Greensboro Bend, ran into a chain hook where a new bridge is being built, recently, and when the hook struck the windshield the glass flew into Mr. Piper's eyes. He closed them and the car ran into a telephone pole, breaking it off and damaging the car considerably.

Edward Scully, employed by Judge Edward L. Bates in Bennington, fell from a tree Sept. 21 and broke his right leg. Mr. Scully had been gathering autumn leaves with which to decorate the Bates home for reception and dropped to the ground, after cutting branches, miscalculating the distance and breaking the leg.
