WORLD SERIES MAKES HEROES

Among Baseball Fans Speculation Is Rife as to 1917 Contests

VETERANS FOUND ON BOTH TEAMS

But the New York Giants Have More Than Chicago White Sox

New York, Sept. 29.—One of the outstanding features of the world series history has been the fact that almost every contest of this baseball classic has developed one or more so-called heroes...

The pitching of Christy Mathewson in the series against the Philadelphia Athletics in 1901; the heavy batting of Franklin Baker against the Giants in the Philadelphia-New York contests of 1911...

The same can be said of the field play of Harry Hooper in the famous eight-game series between the Boston Americans and the New York Nationals; the work of Third Baseman Robe of the Chicago Americans in 1906...

THE RIVAL MANAGERS

Of the two McGraw has had the longer experience and record in connection with professional baseball and there are few men serving in this capacity to-day who can be said to rank with the manager of the Giants.

McGraw has been called a hard taskmaster by some of the players who have positions under him, but he has never shirked responsibility when disaster has marked his efforts or attempts to outwit the opposing team.

Rowland's characteristics and system are in sharp contrast to those of McGraw. Although exceedingly active on the coaching lines he never loses his calm judgment and is extremely quick to perceive and diagnose the innumerable situations that are constantly arising upon the battlefield of baseball.

Rowland has two penants to his credit, having managed the Peoria club of the Illinois-Iowa-Indiana league, and the Chicago Americans when these teams finished first in their respective circuits.

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EMBARGO ON FOODSTUFFS

Many Commodities May Not Be Exported, Unless to Aid U. S.

IN THE CONDUCT OF THE WAR

Food Grains, Feed Grains, Oil Cakes, Oils, Animal Fats

Washington, D. C., Sept. 29.—A virtual embargo on the export of certain foodstuffs and feeds was declared Thursday night by the exports administrative board in adding a list of articles to those already denied shipment, except where their export will contribute to the conduct of the war.

The commodities added are food grains and feed grains, oil cake and meal, animal fats, vegetable oils, and soap, caustic soda and certain machinery.

In making the announcement the exports board advised exporters and commission agents to obtain licenses before making purchases for export and before reserving tonnage space.

SHIPPING GOODS TO WEST INDIES
