

S. H. S. SENIORS VICTORIOUS

The Defeated Football Team Was Picked from the Other Three Classes

THREE TOUCHDOWNS AND ONE GOAL

The Interclass Game Showed Spaulding Has Much Football Material

The first game of the proposed interclass series between the classes at Spaulding high school was played yesterday afternoon at the Lincoln campus, when a team composed of members of the three lower classes met defeat at the hands of the senior team, the result of the game being the score of 19 to 0. The game was interesting in spite of the unevenness of the score and was attended by a large number of the student body as well as the faculty.

In spite of the fact that both teams played under the disadvantage of not having a coach during their period of practice, both elevens showed up to a good advantage; and had not the quarantine regulations interfered with the opening of sessions, Spaulding would have been represented by an eleven equal to those of past years, as both teams have a wealth of undeveloped material, which should give a good account of themselves. For the losers, Lillie and Vanetti starred, although the playing of Morgan, Polli and Carpenter is worthy of favorable comment.

On the toss-up the seniors won and chose to defend the east goal, they receiving the ball from their opponents, although Wilkin was downed after making only a few yards. On the failure to gain, Geals punted, but the ball was blocked by one of his own teammates, who succeeded in recovering the ball. The ball went to the under-classes a few minutes later on a fumble, it being recovered by Lillie. After making a fair bid for a touchdown by carrying the ball down the field, the picked team was forced to punt and Geals was downed in his tracks. Geals then tore off a handsome end run for 30 yards, but the ball was taken back to its former position a few minutes later, as the senior team was offside, just as the period ended.

The second period opened with the ball in the senior team's possession on the opponents' 15-yard line. After being thrown for a loss of about 10 yards, Geals punted, the ball going only a few yards. From this point, on an intercepted pass, Geals carried the ball across, scoring the first touchdown of the game, Rennie failing to kick the goal a few minutes later. Rennie then kicked off to the picked team, the ball being run back by Vanetti for about 35 yards before he was downed. On their failure to gain, Vanetti again punted to the senior team, Geals carrying the ball about 20 yards. On a series of end runs by Tomasi and Wilkin the ball was taken down the field, but the period ended before a touchdown could be scored, the ball being only a few yards from the picked team's goal. Rennie kicked off to the picked team as the third period opened but the ball

Ham and Bacon Fall in Chicago, Setting National Standard.

Chicago, Nov. 9.—Prices of ham and bacon to the consumer were cut five to 10 cents the pound by the Illinois food administrator yesterday. The government's complete control of the packing industry lends importance to the announcement.

While for the moment the cut applies only to Chicago and suburbs, prices set here eventually will serve as the standard for the whole country.

From this point, Tomasi tore off a handsome end run for about 20 yards, carrying the ball for a touchdown, Rennie succeeding in kicking the goal a few minutes later. CORN YIELD FAR ABOVE BEST HIGH RECORD

November Crop Report Estimates Total at 3,191,083,000 Bushels, a Gain of 66,000,000.

Washington, Nov. 9.—A corn crop larger by more than 66,000,000 bushels than ever grown in the history of American agriculture, is the production of the farmers of the United States this year. The department of agriculture yesterday, in its preliminary estimate of the crop, placed the quantity at 3,191,083,000 bushels.

Conditions since the October forecast caused a reduction of about 19,700,000 bushels in the indicated output. Preliminary estimates of the country's important farm crops were completed yesterday with the announcement of production of late harvested crops in the November crop report of the department of agriculture. Final estimates will be announced Dec. 17.

Stocks of old corn on farms Nov. 1 estimated at 34,745,000 bushels, compared with 37,208,000 bushels a year ago and 109,523,000 bushels the average of the preceding five years.

TO HANDLE FOSS' AFFAIRS

Report That a Committee Has Been Organized for This Purpose

HAS SUFFERED FROM DROP IN SECURITIES

His Share of Holdings Are Estimated at About \$200,000

Boston, Nov. 9.—It is reported that the financial affairs of former Governor Eugene N. Foss are in the hands of a committee and that some of his interests have been liquidated. The Boston News Bureau makes the following statement relative to his affairs:

"It is understood that a committee has been formed to take charge of the affairs of ex-Governor Eugene N. Foss. This committee will take over his securities and his business affairs, including the Sturtevant Blower company and the Steel, Morrison company.

"Governor Foss has for some years been the second or third largest stockholder in Boston Elevated and his holdings of Massachusetts Electric preferred and common have always been large. He has also for years been a firm believer in Brooklyn Rapid Transit. His equities have been estimated at above \$5,000,000. It is understood that the committee has already liquidated some of the stocks, including American Can common. The acute weakness in this issue is believed to have been due in part to his selling.

"The manufacturing establishments of Governor Foss have been doing very important work for the government which should not be interrupted.

"Within the past year, he sold out the Becker Machine company at Hyde Park at a profit of \$1,800,000 and in ordinary times the estate of Mr. Foss could be liquidated with a residue of well as above \$3,000,000, but the shrinkages in his holdings of such stocks as B. R. T., American Can and Erie railroad shares must have been several million dollars. His share holdings are estimated at about 200,000, a considerable part of which it is understood has been recently liquidated.

"The committee in charge of the affairs of ex-Governor Foss consists of Galen L. Stone of Hayden, Stone & Co., William A. Gaston of the National Shawmut bank and Neal Rantoul of F. S. Moseley & Co.

"It is understood the liabilities are about \$10,000,000 and that \$17,000,000 of assets have shrunk to about \$13,000,000. Millions of the assets are in real estate not quickly available.

"The Sturtevant Blower works is in splendid shape, has no obligations outside of current bills and has two years' work on hand. Its orders have risen from \$4,000,000 to \$7,000,000."

Information came yesterday noon that the former governor has been extensively interested in the stock market since the beginning of the war, and that his profits have run to well over \$10,000,000.

Mr. Foss was at his office in the John Hancock building yesterday forenoon as usual, but he denied himself to newspapermen.

A valuable team of horses belonging to Contractor A. M. Brazz of Bellows Falls backed over a bank there Nov. 7 and were drowned. A teamster in charge of the span was about to dump a load of dirt and backed the team too far. Beam jumped when he saw the wagon going and saved himself. The loss is about \$500.


