LABOR UNIONS MUSTN'T SOLICIT

Let the Non-Union Workers Alone, Says the Supreme Court

THIS IN TWO WEST VIRGINIA CASES

Union Conduct Found to Be Unlawful and Malicious

Washington, Dec. 11.—Right of employers to prevent labor unions from soliciting non-union employees to join the labor organizations was upheld yesterday by the supreme court by a divided vote of 6 to 3, in test cases against the United Mine Workers of America and the American Flint Glass Workers' union.

Methods of the labor organization in attempting to unionize the "open shop" workmen and bring about strikes were declared "unlawful" and "malicious." Injunctions, previously given by Federal Judge Dayton in West Virginia to prevent the union activities were sustained.

The court admitted the right of workmen to organize into unions for lawful methods, but held that the employers—the Hitchman Coal & Coke company of West Virginia—were entitled entirely to operate their plants "open shop" and protection and injunction against the labor union were ordered for that purpose.


"By way of justification or excuse, defendants set up the right of workmen to form unions and enlarge their memberships by inviting other workmen to join. The opinion of the court freely conceded this right, provided the objects of the union be proper and legitimate, which is assumed to be true in a general sense, with respect to the United Mine Workers of America.

"But the court holds that it is erroneous to assume that this right is so absolute that it may be exercised under any circumstances and without any qualification; that in truth, like other rights that exist in civilized society, it must always be exercised with reasonable regard for the conflicting rights of others, according to the fundamental maxim, 'So use your own property as not to injure the rights of another.'

"Hence, assuming that the defendants were exercising the right to invite men to join their union, nevertheless since they had notice that plaintiff's mine was non-union, that none of the men had a right to remain at work there after joining the union and that the observance of this agreement was of much importance and value both to plaintiff and to its men who had voluntarily made the agreement and desired to continue working under it, the defendants were under a duty to exercise care to refrain from unnecessarily injuring plaintiff, yet they deliberately and advisedly selected that method of enlarging the union membership which would inflict injury upon plaintiff and its loyal employes by persuading men after man to join the union and, having done so, to remain at work, keeping the employer in ignorance of their number and identity until so many should have joined that by stopping work in a body they could coerce the employer and the remaining miners to organize the mine; and that the conduct of defendants in so doing was unlawful and malicious."

Justices Brandeis, Holmes and Clarke dissented.

"The supreme court holds," the majority opinion held, "that the plaintiff was acting within its lawful rights in employing its men upon the terms that they should not be members of the United Mine Workers; that, having established this working agreement between it and its employes with the free assent of the latter, the plaintiff is entitled to be protected in the enjoyment of the resulting status as in any other legal right; that the fact that the employment was terminable by either party at any time made no difference, since the right of the employes to voluntarily make the work gave no right to defendants to instigate a strike; that plaintiff was and is entitled to the good will of its employes precisely as a merchant is entitled to the good will of his customers, although they are under no obligation to deal with him; that the value of the relation lies in the reasonable probability that by properly treating its employes and paying them fair wages, and avoiding reasonable grounds of complaint, plaintiff will be able to retain them in its employ, and to fill vacancies occurring from time to time by the employment of other men on the same terms, and that defendants could not be permitted to interfere with these rights without some just cause or excuse."

ORANGE COUNTY FARM BUREAU.

Notes for Week Ending Dec. 8.

The first extension school of the season was held in Washington this week from Monday afternoon to Friday afternoon inclusive. Both men and women in separate sessions had a chance to discuss topics of interest to the farm and home. The central theme of the agricultural section was farm management. Mr. Tubbs, by means of charts and illustrations, demonstrated to the satisfaction of those present that the study of the farm as a business was one of the most profitable things a farmer could do. Seven following his suggestion had farm survey records taken of their farm business and started farm account books for future study. Prof. Story in his talks on breeding brought out the value of a more careful study of our breeding stock and its ancestry if we wish to make a success of the purebred stock business. The Wednesday evening talk by J. P. Taylor, of the Greater Vermont association, gave many a new appreciation of the critical situation the world is in at the present time and the aims of the present ruler of Germany. The number attending the school was not as large as those in charge would have liked, but those present showed by word and action that its value to them was well worth the efforts made. The ladies were interested in the demonstrations and talks given on the various home topics. In fact, the men of Washington need to take a back seat as far as attendance goes, because the ladies had an attendance totaling nearly three times that of

The extension service hopes to see the result expressed in the organization of the men and women into clubs continuing the studies taken up in this week. The practical use of

those items which seem to be practical for you, at least trying them out, will show whether the school has been worth its cost.

Miss Dutton and Mr. Beach of the extension service spoke at the Pomona grange meeting at North Tunbridge Saturday.

W. J. Tubbs, farm management demonstrator, together with the county agent and Miss Dutton, spoke at the Williamstown South Hill Farmers' club Thursday evening.

The county agent plans to test at Theford academy and West Newbury creamery Wednesday and Friday afternoons this coming week. He will also be present at farmers' clubs in West Fairlee Center, West Bradford and West Newbury.

Miss Dutton plans to speak and hold demonstrations at Theford hill, North Theford, West Fairlee Center and West Newbury the week ending Dec. 15.

The following week the county agent will test at East Corinth Dec. 18, Vershire Dec. 19, and Stratford Dec. 20.

Recipe for week: Nut and Bean Loaf—Mix two cups of bean, pea or lentil pulp, one cup tomatoes, one slightly beaten egg, two cups nutmeats chopped fine, one cup soft breadcrumbs (or enough to shape it into a loaf). Season with celery salt or minced celery, onion juice and salt. Bake in a greased pan until still enough to slice. This loaf is good hot or cold. It gives as much food value as three pounds of steak and as much protein as one and one-third lbs. of beef. Summary for week ending Dec. 8: Mr.
