

LODGE REPLIES TO SEN. STONE

Declares That Since the War Began No Political Lines

HAVE BEEN DRAWN UNTIL YESTERDAY

Services of the Best Democrats in Country Have Not Been Utilized

Washington, D. C., Jan. 22.—Senator Lodge began at 3 p. m. yesterday to answer the political speech of Senator Stone. He declared that since the war began no political lines have been drawn and "until today no political speeches have been made in the Senate."

Mr. Lodge said he was sorry Mr. Stone had made a political speech, adding: "If there has been any partisanship of any kind until now it has not been in the Congress of the United States." Before Lodge relinquished the floor he took Stone to task for his attack on Roosevelt.

ADMITS BURNING \$50,000 WORTH OF ARMY SUPPLIES

Private Woodward Says He is a Pyromaniac, and Once Fired a Lodging House in Worcester, Mass.

Washington, Jan. 22.—Frederick L. Woodward, a private in the army quartermaster corps, confessed yesterday that he started the fire which threatened the quartermaster storehouse here last week and destroyed \$50,000 worth of food and other supplies.

BILL TO DRAFT MEN FROM 18 TO 62 IN INDUSTRIES

Senator McCumber Introduces Measure Which Is Sent to the Military Committee

Washington, Jan. 22.—Authority for the president to order the registration and drafting of all men between eighteen and sixty-two to be used in the conduct of industries necessary for the war was provided in a bill introduced yesterday by Senator McCumber and referred to the military committee.

AUSTRIANS DEMAND PEACE?

Socialists Declare Question Cannot Be Postponed Any More

STRIKE MOVEMENT SPREADING RAPIDLY

Budapest Now Affected—Transport System at Complete Halt

London, Jan. 22.—The strike movement is spreading throughout Austria-Hungary, and is associated with a demand for immediate peace, according to dispatches received in London from Swiss and Dutch sources. A general strike was declared at Budapest Friday, when the entire transport system came to a standstill; while from all parts of the dual empire strikes and demonstrations are reported.

The food situation and the question of peace were the sole subjects of discussion at the sitting of the budget committee of the Austrian Chamber of Deputies on Friday. The Socialists, according to the dispatches, described the situation as extremely serious and declared that peace could not be postponed.

TWO PLEAD GUILTY TO KIDNAPING BABY KEETS

Taylor Adams and His Son at Marshfield, Mo., Sentenced to Long Terms in Penitentiary

Marshfield, Mo., Jan. 22.—Taylor Adams and his son, Cletus Adams, charged with kidnaping baby Lloyd Keets and with conspiring to abduct C. A. Clement, a Springfield jeweler, entered pleas of guilty in the circuit court here yesterday. Taylor Adams was sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary and Cletus Adams to 10 years.

ORANGE COUNTY FARM BUREAU

Notes for Week Ending Jan. 19.

The following information has been sent to the county agent from the U. S. department of agriculture at Washington. Please get in touch with me as soon as possible if interested:

Local Farmers to Get Nitrate. Washington, D. C.—Notice has been given to E. H. Loveland, agricultural agent for Orange county, that the U. S. department of agriculture will sell at cost a supply of nitrate of soda to farmers in Orange county.

The nitrate was purchased through the war industries board under the authority of the food control act as a part of the program for stimulating agricultural production. It will be unloaded at Atlantic ports and the price will be \$75.50 a ton, free on board cars at port of arrival. Farmers are to pay in addition freight from port of arrival and the state fertilizer tag fee.

Applications for a part of the 100,000 tons of nitrate bought by the government will be received only from actual farmers or owners or holders of farms for use on their land and may be made through County Agent Loveland or through any member of a local committee whose names will be announced later.

No money will be required with the application but upon notice from the county agent, farmers who have signed applications must deposit with a local bank, association, or individual, designated by the secretary of agriculture to act as the farmers' agent for that purpose, money to cover the cost of the fertilizer except the freight charge. After the money is transmitted to Washington the nitrate will be shipped to the farmers. If applications for the nitrate exceed the supply of about 100,000 tons the government will allot the supply on a pro rata basis among those who applied. Applications must be received by Feb. 4.

The county agent has visited meetings of the N. E. M. P. A. locals at Brookfield and East Bethel the past week. J. A. Sturtevant, sheep specialist of the U. S. department of agriculture, now stationed at Burlington, spoke to these meetings and to the grange meeting at Brookfield on the possibilities of sheep raising in this section.

H. J. Dodge, manager of the newly organized Washington County Farmers' Exchange, visited granges at Randolph Center, North Randolph, Brookfield and East Braintree and explained what his organization was trying to do to help the farmers handle their farm supplies and products more efficiently. There was considerable interest and several placed orders with him for seeds.

The county agent tested milk for farmers at Middle Valley creamery Saturday, having 58 samples from 12 different farmers. The usual wide variations in test, productive ability, and feeds were found. It is by comparing notes in this way that we can see which methods are proving most satisfactory.

In the meetings of the two days, the county agent talked on the value of farm accounts and the method used. Ten account books were placed.

Miss Dutton gave a meat canning demonstration at the Brookfield high school and talks to the Brookfield and East Bethel granges on her work and the needs of conservation.

The principal meeting of this coming week is the two-day extension school at North Tunbridge under the auspices of the grange. Poultry, meat canning and farm accounts will be the principal themes for discussion.

L. H. Burgwald, specialist in cottage cheese, will give demonstrations at North Tunbridge and Washington this week. This is a food product which could be more extensively used in these days of meat conservation.

Recipe for week: Escalloped Fish—The ingredients are 1 1/2 cups of fish, 3/4 cup of buttered crumbs, 1 cup of white sauce. Make the white sauce by melting 2 tablespoons butter in a saucepan. Add 2 tablespoons flour, stir until smooth, and add 1 cup of milk gradually. Boil from 3 to 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper. Put alternate layers of fish and white sauce in a buttered baking dish. Cover with crumbs and brown in the oven.
