The grocers of Bellows Falls at a meeting Monday decided to go onto a sugar card system.

Trained nurses in Rutland have increased their pay schedule from \$21 to \$25 a week for ordinary cases and for contagious cases the price is \$35 per week.

Because of the small number of applicants for dairy instruction at the college of agriculture, University of Vermont, the proposed course has been given up. There is so great a shortage of labor at home that farmers cannot leave to take the course.

A PROMINENT DRUGGIST.

Ernest J. Alexander of St. Albans Died Suddenly of Angina Pectoris.

St. Albans, Feb. 14.—Ernest J. Alexander, for many years a leading druggist of St. Albans, died suddenly yesterday morning at his home of angina pectoris. He was born in Evansville, in the town of Brownington, on April 26, 1863, and in 1882 began the druggist occupation in Bradford. Two years later he came to St. Albans and was employed in a drug store a few years, later being similarly engaged in Rutland. In 1889 he engaged in the drug business under the firm name of McLeod & Co., and five years ago became the sole owner of the business. Mr. Alexander was prominent in Masonry and was a member of Cairo temple of the Shrine.

On June 5, 1891, he married Eva M. Woodard of Bakersfield, and she survives him, together with five sons, as follows: Harris W., now in the dispensary of the 104th field artillery, 20th division, American expeditionary forces; Edward J., a junior in Yale university; E. Carleton, a sophomore in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology; Robert B. and Jack J., who reside at home.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon, Rev. John B. McGee, pastor of the Methodist church officiating.

SHEEP OVERTURNED LANTERN

And Four Buildings on East Putney Farm Were Burned.

Brattleboro, Feb. 14.—Sheep overturned a lantern in a barn at the Shaw place in East Putney yesterday. 
