HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

The Epworth league of the Burlington district is to hold a rally in Rutland Feb. 27.

Alvin C. Squires, for 16 1/2 years a rural mail carrier in New Haven, has resigned, to take effect March 1.

A call has been extended by the Congregational church of Hyde Park to Rev. Arthur Mercer of Seokong, Mass.

C. B. Bullard of Weybridge recently dressed a heifer less than three years old which weighed 601 pounds and brought \$1,103.20.

Leo, little son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Parker of Monkton, fell from a chair onto a stove recently and burned one side of his face badly.

Allen S. Morgan of Burlington has the honor of holding the best record for marksmanship at the first signal corps school at the University of Vermont.

Not in years have there been so many frozen pipes in Rutland as this season. Seventeen men are kept busy most of the time working on pipes and hydrants.

Rev. George Pomfrey, pastor of the Baptist church in West Derby, who resigned, to take effect March 1, has reconsidered and will remain. The church has increased his salary.

Oliver Curtis, who has been in active service with a Canadian regiment in France, has been honorably discharged and is on his way to his home in St. Johnsbury. He was wounded in the knee.

While sawing wood with a circular saw rig in West Charleston, G. W. D. Reed was badly hurt when his frock caught in the belt. His clothing was torn, one arm was hurt and two ribs were broken.

Burlington merchants and business concerns took no heed of Washington's birthday as to observing it as a holiday, deciding that it would make up for one of the countless Mondays in which they had remained closed.

Pvt. C. M. Parkhurst of Norwich, a member of the 301st signal battalion at Camp Devens, Mass., died Wednesday night in the hospital there as the result of an attack of pneumonia-meningitis following measles.

During the thunder storm of Feb. 14, lightning struck a tree between the residences of L. A. Cartland and A. M. Carpenter in Jeffersonville and followed the wires to each of the houses, setting both on fire and doing considerable damage.

Miss Margaret Gilmour, teacher of domestic science at People's academy in Morrisville for the past year, has resigned and gone to her home in Ogdensburg, N. Y., where her marriage to James Reed of Worcester, Mass., will take place soon.

Rev. F. A. Stockwell, who went to Camp Devens, Ark., Mass., in December to do Y. M. C. A. work, has been obliged to resign and on March 1 will resume his pastorate of the Universalist church at Morrisville, his three months' leave of absence expiring at that time.

Two deer that wandered into an orchard in West Bridgewater recently and on account of the snow were unable to go further, were driven by boys into a barn nearby. Later they built a yard for the deer, which have become so tame that they eat out of people's hands, preferring candy, sweets and tobacco.

The news of the death of Private Gardner H. Bennett of Sutton, which occurred in France, came by telegram from the war department to his parents only 24 hours after they had received his first letter. He sailed early in January, having enlisted from Boston, where he was at work. His parents live on a farm and he leaves two brothers and a sister.

The death of Thomas Baker in Fargo, N. D., formerly of Barton, who represented that town in the legislature of 1857-8, leaves but two survivors of the Vermont legislatures prior to 1860 and these two are Senator George F. Edmunds of California, who represented Burlington in 1854-5-6-7-8-9, and Stanley W. Smith, who represented Addison in 1858-9.

Charles Williams who died in Concord recently, was born in Westchester, England, in 1840, and came about 52 years ago to Quebec with the soldiers who came to guard the ports. After serving a year, he bought his discharge from the army and returned to Vermont. He was a member of the Vermont legislature prior to 1860 and these two are Senator George F. Edmunds of California, who represented Burlington in 1854-5-6-7-8-9, and Stanley W. Smith, who represented Addison in 1858-9.

A new regiment of cavalry, to be known as the 310th, national army, is to be organized from the various contingents of the country and is to be stationed at Fort Ethan Allen inside of a few weeks. The regiment will contain about 1,600 men and probably will take the place of the Second cavalry, who will be transferred for duty elsewhere.

Mrs. Harry Dane was awakened at her home in West Charleston one night recently by the smell of smoke, and found that an oil heater in the cellar had exploded. The sacks were badly burned and shavings in the bulkhead were blazing. The fire was extinguished at once, but the smoke had so permeated the house that much of the paint and paper were ruined, as well as some furniture.

The horse and cutter belonging to Daniel O'Brien of South Burlington, which was stolen from Main street in Burlington, where he had left it hitched, was found in Bridport several days later. Harry Russell, aged 17 years, was arrested, charged with the theft. He will be tried later. Russell's home is in Ferrisburgh, and it is said that he was wearing O'Brien's fur coat, which the latter had left in the sleigh, when he was arrested in Bridport.

Officials of the Vermont Milk Chocolate company have known for some time that sugar and chocolate was disappearing mysteriously from their Burlington plant, but it was not until they apprehended Peter Drinkwine, about 65 years of age, with his dinner pail full of pulverized sugar and his pockets full of milk chocolate, that one source of the leak was discovered. Drinkwine was fined \$10, with costs of \$11.25 in city court. Investigations are continuing and it is suspected that Drinkwine is not the last to be brought to account.
