Grange Workers Observe Wedding Anniversary. Mr. and Mrs. J. Hunt Clark observed their 50th anniversary Feb. 13 at their home in Westminster West. Mrs. Clark's grandfather, Dr. Edward R. FAMILY IN BAD SHAPE. Burlington People Cold and with Very Little Food.

Burlington, Feb. 23.-Arthur Bacon, who came to Burlington a few months ago from Searsburg, in the southern part of the state, accompanied by his wife and three small children, is in trouble.

Present arrangements are carried out two of the children will commence living at the Home for Destitute Children, while the third will be placed in the care of friends.

They found the situation pretty bad. The house was cold and what scraps of food there were were badly messed. The children were indescribably dirty and the three small rooms where the family lived were very much neglected.

The case was reported to the charities department and a conference held with the health officer and Mr. Delany, poor master. It appears that Bacon has been employed at the chocolate factory nights but gave up the job because he said he couldn't get enough sleep in the daytime for the racket the children made. He had words with his wife about it.

Warning for Annual City Election March 5, 1918

The legal voters of the city of Barre, Vermont, are hereby notified and warned to meet on Tuesday, March 5, 1918, at 6 o'clock in the forenoon in their respective wards at the several voting places hereinafter named, for the purpose of electing a mayor, city clerk, city treasurer, first constable, second constable, three directors of French's Barre library and three auditors, all of whom shall hold office for one year; also one assessor to serve for three years; also to vote upon the following questions:


