MAY BE BARRED FROM VERMONT.

All Liability Companies Having Stipulation Objected to by Commissioner.

Insurance Commissioner J. G. Brown has sent to the liability companies in the state and those doing business in Vermont a letter setting forth why he cannot allow them to do business if they do not conform with the provisions of the following letter:

To all companies doing liability business in Vermont: Upon examination of numerous liability policies issued by the various companies doing business in this state, it is found that the policies of most all companies include a clause similar to the following:

"No action shall be maintained against the company under this policy unless it be for the recovery of money actually paid by the assured in full satisfaction of a judgment against the assured after trial of the issue."

The inclusion of this clause in any form of contract issued in this state is objected to by this department, and all companies doing liability business in Vermont will please advise this department if they will consent to discontinue the use of any such or similar clause in their policy contract on and after April 1, 1918.

This department is not willing to allow a policy to be issued in this state with its permission, which contains a clause that requires an assured to go into solvency or bankruptcy before he can bring suit against a company for an accident, which may occur, for which he is unable to pay. Similar forms of policies require that the payment shall be "made in cash" not allowing any other form of payment to be made.

The companies doing liability business in Vermont will please take notice that this department will refuse to license any company to do liability business in this state after March 31, unless such company agrees to eliminate such or any similar clause from all its contracts issued in this state.

Early notice is given to all companies in order to give ample time to correct their policy forms by endorsement or otherwise prior to April 1.

The Voice of New England.

Of the American expeditionary forces at the fighting front in France to-day more than one-third hail from the six New England states. In the daily additions to the national roll of honor the names of New Englanders are leading; for New England guardsmen were the first to follow the regulars overseas and under fire, and they share with the regulars in the front trenches today the precious privilege of holding a small sector of the long line which the allies have at last assigned to the American defenders. Here we see history repeating itself—the proud history of the war for independence and of the war for the preservation of the union. New Englanders have never been "too proud to fight." Now, when they may have been held to be "kept out of war" died the day the Lusitania was sunk, and in its place developed the determination to "keep the faith." From that day the voice of New England was calling for the declaration of war, which finally came and carried the country into the conflict on the side of the allies and in support of the common cause.

Surely the leadership of New England soldiers "over there" imposes an obligation of leadership upon the unlucky New Englanders left behind. Now is the time for the voice of New England to be raised again in a resolution against any parleying with the enemy for peace. Where are the six New England governors? Faneuil hall would be a good place for them to get together this month and raise the voice of New England in support of the overwhelming victory that can alone conquer the peace of justice and of right for which New Englanders overseas are gloriously giving their all to-day. Let New England lead and the world will soon know that the voice of New England is the voice of the nation.—Boston Transcript.
