Barre young men, who in their questionnaires referred to varying degrees of familiarity with automobiles are in receipt of queries from Supt. C. H. The letter indicates that if enough young men eligible in the draft are enrolled, an evening school will be established in Barre for the purpose of teaching auto driving and engine work.

The evening was pleasantly spent in a social manner, dancing and other forms of entertainment being indulged in by the merry-makers, while refreshments of cake and coffee were served by several of the young ladies present. Burning motors in one of the main line cars of the B. & M. T. & P. Co. disrupted service on the interurban and Washington street lines yesterday afternoon. Shortly after leaving the capital, the car due to arrive in Barre at 2:40 was partially disabled by the burning of two motors. The car made the city square terminal on the remaining motors and then sent in its resignation. While the operators waited for relief, the small car was taken from the Washington street line and posted off to Montpelier to maintain the main-line service. Relief came at last from the car barns, and for the remainder of the day a relief car completed the schedule. The motors will be replaced at once.

Now and then unsubstantiated reports that a robin has been sighted in Barre have been heard, and people who forget that crows sometimes wear a Vermont winter have told of seeing the black pirates, but the first genuine harbinger of spring is believed to be a flock of horned larks observed yesterday. The birds have been flocking around small areas of wooded land in and near the city for several days, but one bird lover did not get a clear view of the early arrivals until yesterday. They are supposed to be migrating to their summer breeding grounds, and may be expected to arrive and depart in numbers within the next fortnight. The horned lark is somewhat larger than the common sparrow, and may be distinguished by its brown and buff coat, and the black crescent at the throat.

One of four postulants who were clothed in the habit of the Sisters of Mercy at Mount St. Mary's academy in Burlington Tuesday was Miss Kathleen Miles, a daughter of D. M. Miles of Barre. Rev. J. J. Rice, D. D., bishop of the Roman Catholic diocese of Burlington, performed the ceremony, and of the several clergymen present in the sanctuary, two are former curates of St. Monica's church, Rev. Arthur C. Griffin of Wallingford and Rev. A. Hugh McKenna of Pittsford. A Burlington contemporary gives the following account of the ceremony: "The postulants, dressed in bridal robes, approached the altar and requested admission and the habit of religion, and when Bishop Rice, in the name of the church, granted their petitions, they withdrew to exchange their festive garments for the somber robes of the Sisters of Mercy." Miss Miles assumes the name of Sister Mary Assumpta in entering her novitiate. After attending the graded schools in Barre she enrolled as a student at Mount St. Mary's.
