TO IMPROVE MARKSMANSHIP.
State Will Put Volunteer Militia at Work Breaking Clay Birds.

The state has appropriated \$5,000 to be used this year by the several companies of the Vermont volunteer militia in target practice. In some of the towns where there are companies there is a gun club which has offered its apparatus to the company, but in those places where there is no club the state is planning to equip a trap. Co. I of Montpelier has been given the use of the Montpelier Gun club's trap shooting apparatus.
Targets similar to those used in trap shooting will be used for riot gun practice. They will cost about a cent apiece, covering charges to lay them down at the traps in the state. This will give the men an opportunity to acquaint themselves with their new guns which are powerful ones and are claimed to be more effective in quelling a riot than rifles.
