HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

George A. Griswold, an inmate of the Soldiers' home in Bennington, who was taken to the retreat in Brattleboro last week, died there Monday.

Ralph E. Carr of St. Johnsbury died April 15 in North Springfield of bronchial pneumonia. Mr. Carr, who was 23 years old, leaves a mother and two brothers in St. Johnsbury.

Captain Walter C. Piper of Detroit, Mich., a former resident of Brattleboro, is a candidate for the Republican nomination for representative in Congress from the 13th district of Michigan.

On account of the illness of Miss Katharine D. Denning, soloist, the presentation of the opera, "Chimes of Normandy," by the Brattleboro high school chorus has been postponed indefinitely.

Mrs. F. W. Cheever of St. Johnsbury, 78 years old, since last June has knitted 105 pairs of socks. She has made several scarfs and pairs of wristers and aims to complete 125 pairs of soldiers' socks by June.

Oscar Kahn, a Morrisville junk dealer, has earned \$200 for the Red Cross, as he offered all the proceeds of his business for one week to that organization, and that was the amount received. Mr. Kahn expects soon to be called to service.

The javelin throw is included in the list of events to take place at the athletic meet in Brattleboro May 23. This event has never before been included in the Brattleboro program, but it will probably in time entirely displace the hammer throw, being considered less dangerous.

Mr. Gilson remains on the board of directors, but other business engagements demand his time and felt he could not continue in the office of treasurer.

The stump of a tree that had slid down a hill in a landslide on the West River railroad between Jamaica and South Londonderry ripped off all the car steps on one side of a passenger train Monday on its way to South Londonderry from Brattleboro. The engineer discovered the stump, but could not stop the train. The crew and passengers were slightly jarred. No one was injured.

Thomas Cooper and a young woman, both colored, were arrested in Windsor April 14, charged with stealing household utensils from the Windsor house. Both have been employed there for the past few months and \$100 worth of articles have disappeared. Two trunks were found filled with the stolen goods. Cooper was sentenced to from two to four months in the house of correction at Rutland and the woman to three months in the Woodstock jail.

NOT GUILTY OF MALPRACTICE.

Dr. J. S. Eastwood of Rutland Acquitted By Jury. Rutland, April 18.—A verdict for the defendant was returned by the jury in Rutland county court yesterday in the case of Rufus D. Nims of Brandon vs. Dr. J. S. Eastwood of the same town, the jurors finding that the physician was not guilty of malpractice. Mr. Nims suffered a fracture of the thigh in December, 1916, and is still obliged to go about on crutches. He contended in the suit that his present condition is due to failure of the doctor to give him proper treatment at the time of the injury.
