

GERMANS, REPULSED ALONG WHOLE LINE, STOP INFANTRY EFFORTS ON LYS FRONT; BOTH WINGS OF ALLIES STAND FIRM

Enemy Used Six Divisions Around Givenchy and After Suffering Heavy Losses Gained Footing at a Few Places in the British Front Line

BRITISH AND FRENCH WIN MINOR SUCCESSES AT SOME POINTS

London, April 19.—Enemy attacks on the British lines in the northern part of the Lys battle area south of Kemmel yesterday morning were successfully repulsed, the war office announced today.

In minor enterprises at various points during the night the British captured a few prisoners and some machine guns.

Further attacks last evening south of Kemmel were broken up by British artillery and machine gun fire. The Germans were completely repulsed in an attack yesterday around Givenchy on the southern side of the Lys battle front.

With the British Army in France.—Exhausted by the failure of yesterday's attacks on Givenchy on the La Basse front, the Germans made no further move during the night.

The British re-established their lines west of Rebecq on the southwestern part of the Lys battle front by recapturing ground at the Reif du Vanage farm yesterday afternoon.

GERMANS REPULSED ON LYS BATTLE FRONT

Bombardment Was Followed By Several Strong Attacks on Thursday, Haig Reported Last Night.

London, April 19.—Field Marshal Haig's report last night said: "There has been severe fighting again to-day on the greater part of the Lys battle front from the La Basse canal at Givenchy to the Lys river east of St. Venant. The bombardment was reported followed by strong hostile attacks, all of which have been repulsed."

"The losses inflicted on the attacking German infantry by our fire are again reported to have been extremely heavy, and over 200 prisoners have been taken. The struggle has been particularly fierce in the neighborhood of Givenchy, where the enemy made determined efforts without success to retrieve his previous failures. The fighting in this locality has not yet ceased and the activity of the enemy's artillery is continuing on the whole of this front."

"Later in the day further attacks, accompanied by heavy shelling, developed against our positions south of Kemmel and were repulsed. "Beyond considerable artillery activity in different sectors, particularly south and north of the Somme, there is nothing of special interest in report from the British front."

FRENCH ADVANCED IN SENECAAT WOOD

And Made Progress in Other Places on the Amiens Front, According to Last Night's Statement in Paris.

Paris, April 19.—French forces in the region of Amiens have captured a portion of the Senecat wood and made advances against the Germans in several other sectors, according to last night's official communication.

"SANGUINARY LOSSES"

Inflicted on French at Moreuil, According to Berlin Statement.

Berlin, April 19.—Last evening's report from headquarters says: "In Flanders, on the Lys battlefield the situation is unchanged. Northeast of Moreuil strong French attacks broke down with sanguinary losses."

ITALIAN PATROL SCORES

Capture Austrians on Asiago Plateau and in Monte Tomba Area.

Rome, April 19.—The official communication from headquarters Wednesday said: "Patrols on the Asiago plateau and Italian patrols in the Monte Tomba area captured prisoners and material. At Gondo Loop, east of Fossalta, we prevented the enemy from launching boats. One of our assault parties crossed the Piave and inflicted casualties on the enemy."

"In the Lagarina valley we carried out effective artillery work, hitting a military train standing in the Rovereto station, and also set fire to some depots at Mori."

BRITISH SERGEANT CAPTURED 36 GERMANS

And Along with Them 6 Machine Guns and a Trench Mortar—Naturally Enough, He Has a Victoria Cross.

London, April 19.—(Correspondence of Associated Press).—How Sergeant William Grimbaldeston of the King's Own Scottish Borderers, though armed only with one bomb, captured thirty-six Germans with six machine guns and a trench mortar, and thereby won the Victoria Cross, is thus told in an official narrative:

"During the course of an attack, Sergeant Grimbaldeston noticed that the advance of the battalion on his left was being checked by heavy machine-gun fire from a large block house. He at once collected four rifle-grenadiers, and instructed them to open as rapid a fire as possible on the blockhouse, thus assisting one of our trench mortar batteries, which was also concentrating on the same target."

"The ground between him and the block house was open and entirely devoid of cover. In spite of this he made his way across it in a series of rushes, followed closely by his small band of riflemen."

"Under a hail of bullets from the enemy machine guns, and armed with only one hand grenade, he worked his way round to the entrance at the rear of the blockhouse. With this solitary weapon he suddenly appeared in the midst of the enemy, and persuaded each gun team in turn to lay down its arms."

"So it happened that thirty-six Germans, with their six machine guns and a trench mortar, surrendered to one British soldier and a bomb. By his bravery and initiative he was thus responsible for the capture of this stronghold with its defenders, and at the same time prevented what threatened to become a critical situation."

FRENCH WIPE OUT MACHINE GUN NESTS

Reduced Armament on Front of Yesterday's Attack Southeast of Amiens—Heavy Artillery Fighting Continues in That Region.

Paris, April 19.—The French last night reduced German machine gun nests on the front of yesterday's attack southeast of Amiens, the war office announced today. There was heavy artillery fighting in that region.

GOODS BY RAIL STOLEN

Both Germany and Austria Seem to Be Best with Thievery.

Zurich, April 19.—Official reports of the Prussian state railways show that in 1917, 57,000,000 marks were paid as compensation for property lost or stolen in transit compared with 4,000,000 in 1914.

The German postoffice paid three million marks in compensation during 1917 compared with one hundred thousand in 1913. The greater part of the goods stolen on the railways was foodstuffs, clothing and other articles of necessity.

The robberies on the Austrian railways are reported to be even greater than in Germany. The ministry of railways in Vienna says the public not to send goods by rail except in the most urgent cases.

KING GEORGE SIGNS MAN-POWER BILL

Measure Now Ready for the Filling Up of Some of the Depleted Ranks of the British.

London, April 19.—All the remaining stages of the man-power bill were concluded yesterday and royal assent was given to the measure.

ALLIES SPRING GAS SURPRISE ON GERMANS

Suddenly Use Poison Shells After Deluging Foe for Hours with Mere Stink—2,000 Teutons Were Caught Without Masks.

Paris, April 19.—The evolution of the use of gas shells has taken surprising form in the present battle. One new method is to fire heavy slowly dispersing gases along charred lanes against the enemy, filling in the alternative spaces with quickly dispersing poison fumes. Trooping attacks are then made by troops who charge when a sufficient interval of time has been given for the light gases to rise. The British gunners at one part of the line threw shells charged simply with a stinking composition. The Germans, after a few hours, discovered that this was non-poisonous and began laying aside their masks.

After these shells had been fired for another 12 hours there was a sudden change to poison gases. About 2,000 Germans were caught without their masks and suffocated.

GERMANS BEGINNING TO WHINE AGAIN

Wince Because Allies Raid Towns in Reprisal for Similar Attacks Started by Teuton Airmen.

London, April 19.—A Reuter's despatch from Amsterdam says that according to advices from Berlin, during Wednesday's sitting of the Reichstag, Herr Geck, Socialist, suggested making an agreement with the allies to cease aerial attacks on open towns outside the war zone. A government representative replied that no official request hitherto had come from the allies, but that should it be received it would be examined by the military authorities.

NO WEAK SPOT

And British Line Is Stronger Than It Has Been for Days.

Ottawa, April 19.—The British battle line is more secure than it has been for days, justifying the belief that the enemy may be held in his present position, says a Reuter's dispatch from London. The change of front of the German attack to the region of Givenchy and east of Moreuil found no weak spot in the British resistance at the close of yesterday's fighting.

RESCUED A COMRADE

Sergt. William J. Sauvville of Bennington Slightly Wounded.

Bennington, April 18.—Mess Sergt. William J. Sauvville, Co. B, 6th Engineers, whose name appeared among the wounded in the casualty list of April 10, went over the top and brought in a wounded comrade the first day he was in the trenches, according to a letter received yesterday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Sauvville. The letter also states that his wounds are not serious—cut on the head from shrapnel and a torn finger.

The sergeant writes that the regiment was called to the front on March 27, and ordered to dig a trench on the front line. On the morning of the 28th with the other cooks he went into the trench to distribute rations. While the cooks were passing food they were told that there were three men lying in front who could not be reached because they were covered by German machine guns.

While the engineers were discussing the possibility of a rescue, one of the wounded men was seen to rise to his feet and attempt to make his way toward the American line. The sergeant at once climbed out and brought him in.

It was on the afternoon of the same day while he was making another trip to the trench with rations that the sergeant was wounded. He is now in a base hospital and writes that he is comfortable.

RHEIMS RUIN COMPLETED BY VANDALS

Germans Have Fired More Than 100,000 Shells Into French City During Past Week and Flames of Conflagration Can Be Seen Many Miles Away.

Paris, April 19.—Rheims, which has been on fire for a week, is now nothing but a great pile of smoking ruins. During the past week the Germans have fired more than 100,000 shells into the heart of the city, according to the correspondent of Le Matin.

The flames from the burning buildings can be seen by aviators 60 and 70 miles away. The streets have disappeared from view under the accumulation of debris. The vaulting of the cathedral is falling stone by stone and soon there will be nothing left but the west front and the pillars.

COTTON PRICES SMASH OFF \$8 ON A BALE

Price Fixing Rumors Responsible for a Sharp Drop on New York Exchange.

New York, April 19.—Another smash occurred in the cotton market yesterday, prices dropping about \$8 a bale. The break was attributed chiefly to renewed reports of price fixing in the cotton goods trade.

Quotations opened at an advance of 35 to 40 points and soon sold at \$12 a bale above the low level of Tuesday, but July almost immediately dropped from 29.85 cents a pound to 28.22, a recession of 163 points. Frequent rallies and bullish spot advices were unable to offset the heavy bearish sentiment.

FELL OFF FREIGHT CAR

Richard Harvey of Barre Landed in Frog Pond with Two Broken Ribs.

Franklin, N. H., April 19.—Richard Harvey of Barre, Vt., who was riding on the top of a freight car Tuesday evening, rolled off while the train was going through East Andover and landed in a frog pond. He waded out into the pond until the water reached his neck, then turned and waded toward the railroad, all the time shouting for help. Men arrived in time to rescue him from the pond. His condition was found to be serious.

He was placed aboard a southbound freight and taken to Franklin passenger station, whence the ambulance conveyed him to the Franklin hospital. Among his injuries are two broken ribs. Harvey had been in this city Tuesday afternoon and is believed to have climbed aboard the freight train and fallen asleep on the top of a car. His brother, James Harvey of Portsmouth, N. H., was notified of the accident.

SCHWAB DECLARES JOB "FEARFUL" ONE

Director General of Emergency Fleet Corporation Calls for Encouragement, Not Criticism.

New York, April 19.—Charles M. Schwab left here yesterday for Washington to assume his duties as director general of the emergency fleet corporation. He pleaded for a "spirit of praise and not one of finding" concerning the shipping problem.

"It is a fearful job I have taken," he said, "and must be expanded by encouragement. I think the work of Mr. Hurley and Mr. Piez has been wonderful to date. People ought not to find fault with them, but encourage them."

TOTAL \$1,161,510,000 TO-DAY

Liberty Loan Is Well Started Toward the Second Billion.

Washington, D. C., April 19.—The subscription to the Liberty loan was raised to \$1,161,510,050 by additional receipts received at the treasury department today.

April 26 will be Liberty day throughout the United States under a proclamation issued last night by President Wilson calling on citizens of every community to hold Liberty loan rallies and liberally pledge anew their financial support to sustain the nation's cause.

Patriotic demonstrations similar to those on the opening day of the campaign will be held on April 26 and the day will be devoted to giving the race toward the three billion dollar war credit goal a new impetus for the final week.

WASHINGTON LETTER #760

Document Concerning His Love for Mrs. Curtis Sold in London at Sotheby's.

London, April 19.—A letter from George Washington to Miss Fairfax, dated Sept. 12, 1758, concerning his love for Mrs. Curtis, whom he married in 1759, brought \$700 at Sotheby's yesterday. It was bought by American agents.

ITALIANS ON FRENCH FRONT

Form the Right Wing of the Allied Army There

ITALIAN EMBASSY IN WASHINGTON SAYS

Premier Orlando Announced Plan, Too, in the Italian Chamber of Deputies

Washington, D. C., April 19.—Italian regiments already are in France and form the right wing of the allied armies, the Italian embassy announced today.

Rome, April 19.—Premier Orlando announced in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday that Italian troops would be despatched to the battle front in France. He said: "Italy, which follows with admiration the heroic efforts of the Anglo-French troops on the western front, could not remain absent from the battlefields of France. She wishes to bring to her allies tangible proof of solidarity, and very soon the colors of Italian regiments will fly over the fields of Picardy beside those of the French, British, Americans, Belgians and Portuguese."

The announcement was received with a storm of applause.
