HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

In a one-day campaign in Newport, over \$14,000 was raised for the war chest fund.

The annual meeting of the Franklin County Medical Society was held at the St. Albans hospital to-day.

George W. Fox, the senior member of the firm of Fox & Eaton, which has many theatres, died at his home in Brattleboro May 22.

The insurance on the plant of the Vermont Milk Chocolate Company in Burlington, which was destroyed by fire a few weeks ago, will be settled this week and work will begin at once on the clearing away of the debris.

George Smith, 95 years old and a Civil War veteran, attended the Memorial services in the Congregational church in Sharon last Sunday. He served in a Maine regiment during the war. Another veteran present was Nelson Snow, 78.

M. M. and C. R. Taplin of Orleans have bought the entire holdings of the Silby Lumber Company in Lowell, consisting of 1,700 acres of real estate, one of the best equipped sawmills in the state, a gristmill, many buildings and all the personal property.

A Troy paper printed the list of subscribers and the young man's parents followed up the trail. He had been working in a collar shop in Troy, but returned home with his father.

Miss Myra Campbell, a school teacher in Stowe, was badly bruised and received a cut an inch and a half long near one temple last Sunday afternoon, when a horse which her brother was driving to take her from her home to her school ran away. A younger sister had one ankle bruised in jumping, but when the teacher jumped her feet became entangled in the reins and she was dragged some distance.

Sophy, the two-month-old daughter of Andrew Matevich, died last week in the Russian orphanage in Springfield, where she was taken after the death of her mother and two sisters in the fire of April 6 at the home of the family. The child, then four weeks old, was taken from the house in her crib and received no injuries from the fire, but a month later had an attack of pneumonia, which caused her death.

Gordon Ryea of St. Albans has received a telegram stating that his brother, Fred Ryea, has been killed in action in France. Ryea, who was about 18 years of age, formerly lived in St. Albans, where he was employed at the Tavern. He enlisted in the machine gun company, but was turned down on account of physical disability after they reached Fort Ethan Allen.
