The Red Cross calf, which E. A. Baker of Greensboro contributed for the benefit of the branch in that place, sold for \$500.

Dr. B. D. Adams of Burlington is one of the first in the state to respond to the call for 50 physicians to supply the army and navy.

A final push is being made to raise \$40,000, the sum remaining unprovided for of the \$400,000 endowment fund which Middlebury college is seeking.

A bear that weighed 360 pounds and measured seven feet was killed near West Wardeboro by Albert Robinson, which had killed five sheep the day before.

Elsie May Cox, daughter of Mrs. Annis A. Williams of Rutland, at the authority of the probate court, has changed her name to Althea Arnelious Annis Williams.

Newell Stokes has lost three cows from poisoning at his farm in Starksboro and several others are sick. An investigation is being made to learn the source of the poisoning.

Miss Elsie E. Shippey, a member of the Rutland high school graduating class, has accepted a position as organist and choir director at Trinity church, Claremont, N. H.

The Lake Dunmore house at Lake Dunmore was opened yesterday under the management of Hugh J. McKinnon, a hotel man all his life and for many years connected with the Parker house and the Adams house in Boston. The steward and office manager are also well versed in the hotel business.

Mrs. Sherman Stickney had both bones of her lower right arm broken at her home in Stowe recently when a horse which her husband was leading broke away from him and knocked him down, also kicking Mrs. Stickney as she stepped from a henhouse door into its path. Mr. Stickney was somewhat bruised.

The prize debate of the senior and junior classes of Holy Cross college in Worcester, Mass., was won Tuesday night by the senior team, composed of two Massachusetts men and one Vermont, M. Ward Stales of Brandon. The question debated was "Resolved that the United States government should assume complete ownership of the railroads after the war."

Louis F. Oriol, sr., had a narrow escape from death in Burlington May 29 when, after going to the station to see his wife off, he took a short cut to College street but was struck by a train as he was crossing the tracks. An examination showed that he was badly bruised and some ribs were fractured, injuries which will lay him up for some time. Mrs. Oriol's train had not left and she was notified and gave up her trip.

Octave Lord of St. Johnsbury has been notified by the war department that his son, Sergeant Henry Lord, known in the army as Sergeant Long, was killed in action May 7. He was 35 years old and had been in the regular army nine years. He was a member of Company G, 16th Infantry. He was with the troops in Cuba, saw five years' service in the Philippines and was among the first Americans to land in France. His father is a veteran of the Civil war and was in service three years with a Maine regiment. Sergeant Long formerly lived in Lunenburg.


