Rutland has reduced its indebtedness by the retirement of \$25,000 in water bonds.

Spiritualist meetings at Queen City Park, with nightly seances, are attracting large crowds.

In the small village of Sheldon Springs a Red Cross lawn party recently brought 600 people together.

Howard Cady of Bristol is back in his home town, after having been severely wounded in France.

Dr. Harry Burns, a Middlebury man, now with the 30th Infantry, has received the war cross in France.

Private Kenneth Greene of St. Albans, reported missing in action, has been located in a French hospital.

Chittenden county fair, at Essex Center, is one of the few Vermont fair associations to exhibit this year.

Susan G. Hamblin, wife of the late Deacon Hamblin, was 93 years old when she died in Cornwall this week.

One of Richmond's oldest residents died Monday, in the person of Mrs. Frank Christmas, aged 95 years.

Randolph men are to meet this week to devise plans for furnishing industrial training to registrants soon to be drafted.

By raising the dues to \$6, the directors of the Verulam club for girls in St. Albans hope to weather abnormal conditions.
