A CONFESSION OF GERMAN WEAKNESS.

It is evident that the German high command staked a march on Field Marshal Foch to a certain extent by withdrawing the German main line over a wide front on the southern end of the battle area in France. This withdrawal for a considerable distance partially nullified the effect of the French blow, although, at the same time, it enabled the French to acquire much territory at a minimum cost of men; and it necessitated the moving forward of the battering-ram machinery in order to bridge the intervening gap.

The withdrawal of the German main forces was a confession by the German high command of its growing weakness in man-power, as an army that was confident of its strength would not have given ground even before attack and would have met the oncoming army in the defenses it had held for several years. It would have inflicted as much punishment on the attacking force as was possible and then would have withdrawn to prepared lines only after that work had been accomplished.

NO MENTION OF PROHIBITION. Vermont Democratic State Convention Passed Over It.

The Vermont Democratic state convention at Burlington Thursday afternoon made no reference to the Sheppard amendment. The platform as adopted was as follows:

We, the Democrats of Vermont, in convention assembled, adopt the following as a declaration of our party principles: We stand for the winning of this war of freedom for all peoples of the world. In our hearts we hold unbounded thankfulness for what this nation has been permitted to accomplish to that end, all that has been done therefor, by the matchless words of its president, by the wise enactments of its legislators, by heroic deeds of its soldiers and sailors, the living and those dead on fields of honor, by faithful efforts and patient self-denial of its people, and in humbleness of spirit, we bow before our fathers' God, the God of nations, in appeal that we and all the people of our state may be given the will, the strength, the fortitude, the patience, and the rich grace of understanding hearts, needed to complete this work to which we have pledged and do now pledge ourselves and our all.

To the president of the United States we pledge our unflinching support. At a critical time in the world's history, his wise counsel in formulating the policy and aims of the allies has received the approbation and applause of the entire civilized world; while under his wise leadership American arms have achieved a success unparalleled in our history.

We endorse the national army law and the selective draft law as the best means of winning the present war, and we deplore any attempt by any state, faction, or individual to interfere therewith by propaganda or otherwise.

We condemn every individual group or organization having for its object the promotion of its own interest in disregard of the country's welfare. We particularly condemn the recent attack upon the administration by the chairman of the Republican national committee. We hold that any party or faction that endorses or fails to repudiate such action surrenders its integrity and forfeits its right to the support of loyal citizens.

We approve of the action of the national government and the state of New York in relation to the matter of deep waterways, whereby transportation will be facilitated and cheapened, and we recommend Vermont's co-operation therein.

We declare the present primary election law to be a signal failure, complicated and expensive. We recommend its repeal.

We stand for such revision of the statutes and of existing orders of procedure as shall correct evils found to exist in any department of state government, executive, administrative, inspecting or auditing.

We approve enactment already passed looking to the enfranchisement of women, and we favor such further action as may be needed to make suffrage for women and men equal.

In the light of experience and of our growing knowledge concerning existing possibilities and present and future needs, we favor co-operative efforts by the state and nation in the conservation, development, use and control of the water resources of the state; by the state for the benefit of its citizens. We believe that for doing this there can be found a plan, both proper and feasible, which will enhance and stabilize private investment, and which will in the largest measure guarantee a reasonable return to the investor, a fair cost to the consumer and full return to the state for any expenditures that it may make; and to the people as a whole the maintenance and preservation of their common heritage in a natural resource.

The conservation of coal in our state under present conditions is an absolute necessity, without which extreme suffering is the penalty. We, therefore, oppose any plan to waste the same by an unnecessarily long session of the legislature during the coming winter; and we urgently request the federal authorities to limit the amount to be used for this purpose.

Free public service should be the attitude of every American citizen during the war. With this in view we are opposed to any increase of salary or remuneration of any state official during the present war.

We pledge our party and our candidates to the support of the foregoing declarations.
