

LEFT SICK BED TO KILL SELF

Samuel B. Boyden of Guilford, Aged Nearly 90, Was Ill with Pneumonia

FIRE A BULLET INTO HIS HEAD

He Was a Retired Farmer and a Civil War Veteran

Brattleboro, Oct. 16.—After arising from his bed, where he had been ill with pneumonia, Samuel B. Boyden of Guilford, who was nearly 90 years of age, went quietly out of his house late yesterday afternoon and behind the woodshed he fired a bullet into the side of his head. The bullet lodged at the base of the brain and caused instant death. The weapon, which Mr. Boyden had kept in a box in his bedroom, was rusty and of the English building type. Mrs. Boyden, who had gone out for a brief stay, left a relative at the house, and when the relative went to Mr. Boyden's room he had gone. He leaves a wife and four grown-up children. He recently sold his farm, reserving the right to live there until the end of his days, as he was born on the place. He was a retired farmer and a Civil War veteran.



FIRES STILL BURNING.

Calls for Help Come from Northern Minnesota. St. Paul, Oct. 16.—The state adjutant general's office here received a telephone message early to-day from Colonel H. A. Bellows, of the home guards at Lawler, Minn., asking for additional help to combat the forest fires in that vicinity. More home guardsmen will be sent there as soon as possible, it was announced. Steps to provide funds for rehabilitating sections of northwestern Minnesota, destroyed by the forest fires were taken at a general conference of state officials at Moose Lake to-day.

Amounted to 400,779 Running Bales During September. Washington, D. C., Oct. 15.—Cotton consumed during September amounted to 400,779 running bales, and 96,525 bales of lint, the census bureau to-day announced.



REPORTS 30 PRISONERS.

Gen. Pershing Tells of Attack in Difficult Terrain.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 15.—General Pershing's communique for yesterday, received by the war department to-day, follows: "This morning American troops resumed the advance. North of Verdun they now are operating against positions of greatest strategic value and natural strength. To-day we passed beyond the towns of Cunel and Romagne. We have patrols in the Bois de Bantheville and our line has penetrated the positions of St. Georges and Landrea-et-St. Georges. About 750 prisoners have been reported."

ALASKA AND HAWAII OVER.

Both Are Early Up to the Mark on Fourth Liberty Loan.

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—Alaska and Hawaii have oversubscribed their quotas for the fourth Liberty loan, according to cable advices to the twelfth federal reserve district loan campaign headquarters here. Their quotas were \$1,369,400 and \$6,765,950 respectively.

TORPEDO BOATS TAKE OFF GERMAN TROOPS

Left Zeebrugge During Stormy Night, Each Loaded to Its Capacity with Soldiers. London, Oct. 15.—Several of Germany's largest torpedo boats recently left Zeebrugge, one of the German naval bases on the Belgian coast, during a stormy night, according to a Dutch frontier message, forwarded from Amsterdam on Monday to the Central News. The German warships were filled to their capacity with soldiers and proceeded for Germany. The Germans also are reported to be evacuating Ostend.

Disregarding danger to himself he continued the performance of these heroic deeds until killed."

ALLIES' GUNS HOLD RAILROAD LINES

From Lille to Thourout Germans Have Lost That Means of Communication. London, Oct. 15.—Belgian troops are on the outskirts of Menin and are within two miles of Courtrai. The allies also are in effective artillery range of the railway from Lille to Thourout by way of Courtrai. This means that the allies dominate the connecting link between the German troops around Lille and those in the Ostend sector.

NO FLIGHT TO HOLLAND.

Refugees in German-Held Territory Are to Return. London, Monday, Oct. 14.—It is announced in the Dutch newspapers, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam, that the waves of refugees from German-held territory in France and Belgium, which were expected in Holland will not, after all, flow over into Dutch territory. The people will be permitted to stay in their respective countries, the newspaper states, "owing to Germany's decision to evacuate the occupied territories."

U-BOAT CLIMAX IN WINTER.

Threat Made That Entente Countries Will Have Economic Crisis. Amsterdam, Oct. 15.—There is good reason to believe that the German submarine warfare will reach a climax during the winter, according to the Rhenish Westphalian Gazette, which says it will produce an economic crisis of unanticipated dimensions in entente countries.

SPEED UP ON WARSHIPS.

Urged Secretary Daniels to Meet Threatened U-Boat Menace. Washington, D. C., Oct. 15.—American shipbuilders were called upon by Secretary Daniels to-day to speed up their output of destroyers to meet the menace of the new and greater submarine effort which Germany is known to be planning.
