HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST FROM DIFFERENT SECTIONS

John Stevens will have nearly 2,000 barrels of apples from his orchard in Orwell this season and they are practically all picked.

Leo G. Hakey, who enlisted from Brattleboro, died in a hospital in France Sept. 6, after being struck by a motorcycle. Pvt. Hakey was 28 years old and went overseas in May of this year.

Abbott T. Edwards, 74, a veteran of the Civil war, died at his home in Newfane Oct. 20. He was a member of Co. H, 6th Vermont Volunteers, under Captain Bushnell. He enlisted July 29, 1861, and was discharged June 26, 1865. Influenza, asthma and heart trouble, combined, were the cause of his death.

Dr. Walter H. Clark, a dentist formerly practicing in Brattleboro and later in Keene, N. H., and Greenfield, Mass., died at Bourdeau, France, Oct. 12, and was buried in the Red Cross cemetery there. His friends in this country had just received news of his safe arrival overseas when the announcement of his death came.

The pastor of the Congregational church, Woodstock, Rev. R. W. Barstow, having been appointed chaplain in the army, the church extended a cordial invitation to the Christian church of the town to unite with it in services from Oct. 1, 1918, until May 1, 1919, the pastor of the Christian church, Rev. Alva H. Morrill, to be the pastor of the united congregation. The invitation was unanimously accepted.

To General Pershing is dedicated Dorothy Canfield Fisher's new book, "Home Fires in France." Mrs. Fisher, whose home is in Arlington, is now entering her third year of civilian relief work in France, where she has been actively identified with Miss Winifred Holt in aiding soldiers blinded in battle. She has just opened her Red Cross Home for Delicate Children and is in preparation of a similar institution for tubercular children.

Miss Genevieve Sherwood, daughter of Mrs. Ralph Sherwood of St. Albans, died in New York City Sunday of pneumonia, following influenza. Miss Sherwood, who was 40 years old, was accepted last month as a Red Cross nurse and also as an ambulance driver. She was a nurse in training at the New York eye and ear hospital and would have completed her course in about a week. She had devoted many years to a study of music and was very talented. Dr. Grace Sherwood of St. Albans is her sister.

SUED FOR BREACH OF PROMISE.

Charles H. Lalor, Rutland Hotel Man, Married Oct. 5.

Rutland, Oct. 23.—Charles H. Lalor of this city, one of the best known hotel men in Vermont and for a number of years proprietor of the Hotel Bardwell, Rutland, has been sued for breach of promise by Miss Anna C. Dyer of this city, who seeks to recover \$30,000. The case was filed yesterday at the Rutland county clerk's office and is returnable at the March term of Rutland county court.

Mr. Lalor was married Oct. 5 to Miss Margaret Sullivan of this city. Miss Dyer claims that she became engaged to Mr. Lalor on May 2, 1916, and that on several occasions since she had promised, at his request, to marry him, the latest date being March 28 last.

Miss Dyer is a musician and is unusually attractive. The partners have been served on Mr. Lalor by Deputy Sheriff Henry R. Adams and his deposits in the Rutland Trust company and the Killington National bank have been attached.

POSED AS MILITARY POLICE.

Men in Uniform Obtained Money Under False Pretenses in Vermont.

Keene, N. H., Oct. 23.—George E. Collins of Middletown, Conn., and James Allen of Brooklyn, N. Y., who have been masquerading as military police in uniform and obtaining money under false pretenses were arrested here Monday.

Collins alleged to be a deserter from the depot brigade at Camp Devens. He wore a United States army uniform and Allen had on a Connecticut state guard uniform, claiming to be a member. Allen is in the custody of United States Marshal Carpenter, and will be returned to Camp Devens.

The two men have been working together for the past two months, holding up men in uniform and asking them if they had passes. When they found a man who had overstayed his leave or was without a pass they allowed him to go on receiving \$3 or more. If the man had no funds they sent him back to camp. They returned once to camp from Keene and two from Bellows Falls. They have been working their game in Greenfield, Mass., Bellows Falls and White River Junction, Vt., and Keene.

The scheme was discovered through the larceny of a train conductor's bag in Keene on Oct. 19. The bag was later found minus a punch and, as it was learned that Allen was using a punch, an investigation was begun.


