



The Sharples Milker (one unit) averaged 80 minutes in milking 100 pounds of milk in the New York tests reported in Bulletin No. 7. This is 17.1 minutes faster than the Hinman, 31.1 minutes faster than the Empire, four minutes faster than the Visible, 17.1 minutes faster than the Ueber, 46.5 minutes faster than the B-L-K, and 7.7 minutes faster than the Mehring.
