Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.

In a list of more than 1,000 citations of New England heroes are mentioned Corp. Maurice E. Doolan and Pvt. Raymond Mangan of the 103rd infantry, 26th division. Both young men are from Rutland.

Fay Thompson of Bristol was fined \$300 and costs of \$16.00 in Burlington city court this week, after he had been found guilty of furnishing liquor contrary to law. Thompson was unable to pay his fine and took the alternative sentence of 358 days at the house of correction.

Rev. W. W. Magoun, pastor of the Episcopal church at Fair Haven, has accepted a call to the pastorate of the church in Bellows Falls, succeeding Rev. A. C. Wilson, who has become a Y. M. C. A. secretary in the overseas service. Mr. Magoun will move to Bellows Falls about Dec. 1.

Miss Alice Potts, 28, until recently maternity nurse for the Brattleboro Mutual Aid association, died last week in Philadelphia of influenza. Miss Potts enlisted as a Red Cross nurse and went to Boston Oct. 1, being sent at once to Pennsylvania to care for influenza patients.

On Monday night Rutland people discerned plainly a rainbow, formed when the sky was clear in the east, and the rising full moon was luminous enough to throw on the dark rain clouds in the west a complete bow, although not distinctly enough to bring to bring out the prismatic colors.

At the semi-annual meeting of the board of bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church, held at Yonkers, N. Y., last week, Bishop Charles Bayard Mitchell, D.D., of Minneapolis, Minn., was assigned to hold the Vermont conference and Bishop William Burt, L.L.D., of Buffalo, N. Y., to hold the Troy conference, containing the Burlington district.

A lacquered brass vase, presented the First Baptist church of Brattleboro by Miss Rena M. and Hortense A. Hall in memory of their father, the late Deacon J. Edward Hall, was used for the first time last Sunday. The class in the Bible school of which Deacon Hall was for many years the teacher has furnished the flowers for the morning service for years, after which they are given to the sick.

Mr. and Mrs. Oliver DesLauriers of St. Albans Bay have received a telegram stating that their son, Sgt. Leo DesLauriers, has arrived at a base hospital in West Virginia. He left St. Albans over a year ago with the machine gun company. He was wounded June 16 and never returned to his company. He was able to work, however, and was employed in a government printing office for some time.

When sugar cards first were issued in Brattleboro, the grocers gave them out, and it was soon learned that some persons were taking advantage of the fact and obtaining more than one card. When the new cards were given out, the food administrator had charge of their issuance, and about 200 less were called for than the first time. A population of 7,437 was shown by the cards, this being only approximate.

Foxes are reported to be raising havoc with Vermont's crop of turkeys, according to statements of farmers who come to Burlington from Grand Isle. Some of the biggest flocks of turkeys in the state are ordinarily raised in the island county, but the losses by foxes this year will probably reach several thousand dollars. All over Vermont there has been a big increase in the number of foxes for the reason that there has been very little hunting of them lately.

A revival of wheat culture in Vermont began in 1917 under the call of the government for more extensive planting. About 3,000 acres were raised with a satisfactory yield. So well satisfied were the growers in different parts of the state that in 1918 there were at least 15,000 acres grown, which, with an average yield of about 20 bushels to the acre, would mean 300,000 bushels grown in Vermont this year. This is enough to make about 70,000 barrels of flour.

Mr. and Mrs. Cleophas Desautels observed the 50th anniversary of their marriage at their home in Winooki Monday. Accompanied by the bridesmaid and groomsmen of 50 years ago, Mrs. Napoleon Monzon and Robert Desautels, Mr. and Mrs. Desautels went to church in the morning, where solemn high mass was sung. The choir consisted entirely of members of the family. After the church ceremony, a wedding breakfast was served at their home. During the day they were presented a purse of \$200 in gold. In the evening a reception was held in their honor.

A break in the service water pipe in Brandon Sunday caused a washout, when tons of earth were washed away, leaving a hole some 10 or 12 feet deep, 20 feet wide and 20 feet long. About 25 feet of concrete retaining wall was also washed out. The break was caused by the water pipe from the school for a ground for the electric lighting system in the high school, the electrical connection melting the lead pipe connecting the main with the service pipe, leaving a five-eighths inch opening in the pipe, which did the damage. On account of the break school was closed until Wednesday morning.
