The longer William Hohenzollern stays away from Germany the less his chances of getting back as ruler.

A statement from Berlin says that robberies are being punished in that city by immediate death. Yet the supreme robber of them all, the German nation, seems about to be given life.

Vermont is going through a very disagreeable situation, and the people of the state demand that everything be revealed in connection with the alleged wrong-doing at the State House.

The chairmanship of the Vermont public service commission placed in the hands of Walter A. Dutton of Hardwick brings an experienced and capable official to the position, following the resignation of Robert C. Bacon of Brattleboro.

The extensive preparations which the United States had made for war may furnish some interesting revelations to the people of Germany, who will thereby learn for the first time what their war lords were leading them up against.

The action of the Senate election committee in dropping the action to oust Senator-elect Newberry of Michigan means a Republican majority in the Senate and another serious rebuff to President Wilson, whose protégé, Henry Ford, was the candidate opposed to Newberry.

The withdrawal of the 28th division from the army of occupation and the placing of it in "rest areas" in France are evidences that the division may be brought home early after all. Transportation from the "rest areas" to the port of embarkation would be speedily carried out, and then it would be only a matter of a week, or slightly more, before the boys would be landed at Boston. Then such a welcome!

The success of the second Victory loan in Canada indicates that Canada still has much financial strength despite the drains incident to more than four years of war. The goal set for the loan was half a billion dollars, and it is announced that that amount was oversubscribed by at least fifty millions of dollars. Canada's population has been drained much more than the population of the United States and her industrial life must have been crippled, in consequence, far more than that of the United States; yet Canada sets a rather fair pace along with the United States. Canada is to be congratulated.

Scotland comes into the public eye in the great naval concentrations of the last few days. British, American and French warships stretching in a double column 14 miles out into the North sea from the Firth of Forth and then a single file of surrendered German warships extending a similar distance and passing through the double line. It is probable that there never has been such a concentration of naval strength in all history, not perhaps in the number of ships but in the power of the individual vessels composing the lines. Incidentally, the surrender of the main German fleet to

the allies gives the United States the undoubted position next to Great Britain as a naval force.

LET'S WELCOME PERSHING FIRST.

Fittingly enough, New York City is the first American municipality to extend its hospitality to Field Marshal Foch, commander-in-chief of the allied forces; and it is to be hoped that some day the field marshal will be able to take advantage of the opportunity. However, the first American duty of hospitality should be to extend to General Pershing, commander of the American forces in France, the most generous welcome it is possible for the American people to prepare. General Pershing, to be sure, was operating under Field Marshal Foch and his lustre may have been somewhat dimmed by the exploits of the commander-in-chief of all the armies; but, nevertheless, Pershing is our own commanding officer in the field and he has acquitted himself with great credit not only in actual warfare but in the multifarious duties of preparing the expeditionary forces for service in battle. Therefore, the best that we Americans have in the line of hospitality should be conferred on General Pershing first. That will not prevent us from doing signal favors later on for Field Marshal Foch, the undoubted hero of the war. Therefore, New York City ought immediately to parallel its invitation to Foch by extending the hospitality of the city to Pershing.

A GUARANTEE OF FULFILLMENT BY GERMANY.

The surrender of a considerable section of the main German fleet, following the turning over of a score of submarines, removes the last, lingering doubt of Germany's determination to abide by the terms of the armistice. As long as Germany maintained possession of her fleet intact there was chance to doubt her purpose even though her armies were in complete retreat along the entire front from Holland to Switzerland, because her armies were forced to retreat, in fact, had had the desire to retreat for many months, whereas the fleet occupied its same relative position as regards its security. Behind its mine fields and other protections, the German fleet could have stood out for some time, it is confidently believed, albeit the final defeat of fleet, as well as armies, was not open to question. But now that the German admiralty has surrendered a sizeable section of its fleet there seems to be no reason to believe that the terms of the whole armistice will not be carried out so far as it is within the constituted authorities of Germany to do so. The chaos which is said to exist in some parts of that domain may render the complete fulfillment of the armistice terms difficult, but the allies will probably feel henceforth that every effort is to be made to live up to the armistice, however disagreeable it may be for the Germans.

Fifth ward citizens, who have lodged complaint upon complaint with the city council concerning street conditions in their district, had the satisfaction of seeing matter come to a head yesterday, when Mayor Glysson, Alderman Rizzi and Street Superintendent A. G. Perry made a systematic investigation of highways that come the nearest to being impassable. Ward 5 streets received more notice than usual during the epidemic, when doctors and volunteer workers had frequent occasion to traverse the numerous rough and rocky roadbeds to be found in various parts of the north end. That section of Blackwell street which extends from the bridge to the underpass is cited as a typical example of what neglect has accomplished for the road system. To-day, because of the constant rains, it was well nigh impassable. In adding his official protest to the complaints of his constituents, Alderman Rizzi is said to have threatened to resign from his council if the petitions were not heeded. A promise of immediate relief was the result.

CHRISTMAS LABELS.

Extra Ones May Be Secured from Barre Red Cross by Those Without Any.

The war and postoffice departments have issued an order authorizing the extension of the mailing date for Christmas parcels up to and including Nov. 30.

The war department has also authorized the Red Cross to have printed a sufficient number of additional Christmas labels exactly similar to those received from abroad, these to be furnished on request to chapters, branches and auxiliaries to families who have not received labels from abroad, or who have lost or destroyed their labels. The application must make a statement to the effect that he is the nearest living relative in the United States of the proposed recipient; that he or she has not received a label from abroad and that should such label be received, it would not be used; and that to the best of his or her knowledge and belief only one Christmas parcel will be sent the proposed recipient.

This arrangement went into effect Nov. 21 and there are on hand at the Barre Red Cross rooms an abundance of these labels for those who can comply with the conditions mentioned. So far as known, only about 150 labels have been received from the 400 boys from this locality who are in service. The labels may have been lost or the boys may have been late about sending them home. There is an opportunity now to secure one, so that no boy will be without his one package.
