

ABOUT THE STATE
Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.
Four hundred and sixty-six cartons for soldiers overseas were shipped from Burlington and 335 from Rutland.

A flock of about 100 evening grosbeaks, birds from the Canadian northwest, have been common in Rutland recently.

Rev. R. W. Magoun, formerly of Fair Haven, began his pastorate of Immanuel Episcopal church in Bellows Falls last Sunday.

Dr. Nathan R. Caldwell has resigned as health officer of Burlington and Dr. Charles A. Ravey has been appointed in his place.

Sgt. Claud A. Place of the 461st touring car company, who was wounded in an automobile accident in France, was employed for nine years by the Tuttle company of Rutland as pressman in the printing department.

On the U. S. S. George Washington, which sailed to-day from Hoboken, N. J., with the president's party aboard, Dean Alden, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Alden of Proctor, has been serving since the United States entered the war.

Barrett Carmody, son of Postmaster Daniel J. Carmody of Fair Haven, has just reached this country as a special courier from France. Mr. Barrett was on his way to Washington, D. C., when he telegraphed his father Monday.

Edwin H. Lathrop, aged 76, died at his home in Orleans Dec. 1, after a short illness of acute Bright's disease. He leaves a wife and eight children. Mr. Lathrop was for 26 years, prior to 1917, proprietor of the Valley house of Orleans.

A military funeral was held in Windsor Dec. 1 for Maj. Henry R. Weston, M. D., who died of influenza, which he contracted while his wife was ill with the disease. Major Weston was stationed at Camp Upton and was called home by the illness of his wife, who recovered. He was about 40 years old.

A strict quarantine for influenza has been established in Morrisville for the second time. There are a few light cases of the disease, but as it seemed to be spreading in the schools it was thought advisable to close all public places. This was done after the morning services had been held in the churches Sunday.

The C. E. Davis foundry plant in Rutland was damaged to the extent of \$15,000 in a fire Sunday, which destroyed a building containing the core and pattern rooms. The cause of the fire is unknown. Among the things burned were three patterns necessary for immediate use, in making condensers for emergency fleet work. These were very valuable. The foundry employs about 175 men.

Influenza conditions in Burlington are not improving. Twenty-five new cases were reported Saturday and 15 on Sunday, the number now reaching over 100, exclusive of the winter dormitory at the University of Vermont, where being 60 in the S. A. T. C. alone. The disease is mild and there are few cases of pneumonia. Public schools opened Monday, but all children under 14 years of age are to be barred from attendance at picture shows for the present. Amusement houses will not be closed. Another member of the students' army training corps died Saturday, Raymond Seymour Rublee of East Berkshire, Spanish influenza developing into pneumonia. He was 18 years old.

Frederick J. Blake, a snare drummer for more than 50 years, whose home is in Bellows Falls, was 63 years old Dec. 3. The drum he uses is the oldest and longest kind. It is more than 100 years old. The sticks were used by a brother, G. S. Blake, drum major of the 11th Vermont regiment in the Civil war. In the spring of 1917, when the country declared war on Germany, Mr. Blake, Henry A. Reynolds and Charles E. Farr secured appropriate costumes and organized as "The Spirit of '76." Their appearance at the patriotic demonstrations created much enthusiasm. Their last appearance as "The Spirit of '76" was in a victory parade in Bellows Falls Thanksgiving morning.

BUTTER SCORING.
The 30 Samples Entered Were Not So Uniform as Usual.

The report of the eleventh monthly educational butter scoring of the University of Vermont college of agriculture, with V. R. Jones, O. M. Camburn, M. R. Tolstrup and H. B. Elliott acting as judges shows that 30 samples were entered but they were not so uniform as last month thought the average score, 92.35, was only a little lower. The high score was 94.5 received by both V. A. Vancouver and L. S. Flint.

Results of high churning temperature were noticeable in some samples which showed a rather weak and greasy body. An old cream flavor was in evidence and a few were scored off on undissolved salt and mottles.

The last scoring of the year will be held on Monday, Dec. 16. All samples should be sent so as to arrive in Burlington on Dec. 13 or 14.
