George C. Everest of New Haven received \$3,400 for the milk from 17 cows for the year 1918.

J. S. Hall of Hydeville handled 1,047 cases of ice in one week, filling five ice-houses. He is in his 70th year.

It is stated that a number of out-of-town parties are contemplating the building of summer homes in Stowe this season.

S. J. Maynard, engaged in packing ice for Olin Merrill of Enosburg Falls, has a badly crushed ankle, which was caught between two of the cakes.

Merrill Belden, while helping cut ice in Vergennes, stepped back out of the way of a cake and did it so quickly that a pike pole went through his leg.

After having been closed for a year or more, the Sharon house, at Sharon, will be reopened Feb. 24, with Mr. and Mrs. Fred Byers of White River Junction in charge.

James Barrett, a veteran of the Civil war, died at his home in Rutland Saturday at the age of 79 years. He served in Co. G of the 1st Vermont Cavalry, rising from private to lieutenant.

Pvt. Allen Yett has arrived in Burlington from Yost and is minus his right leg, which was cut off about four inches above the knee, at a base hospital behind the lines in France on Oct. 4.

Henry Allen had his collar bone broken and was considerably injured when his horse became frightened and upset his carriage last week. Mr. Allen is a Grand Isle farmer 78 years of age.

Bertram A. Brehmer has resigned as organist and choirmaster of the Trinity Episcopal church at Rutland. Miss Helen L. Perkins, organist and choir director of Trinity church in Shelburne, will succeed Mr. Brehmer.

Kenneth Lewis, five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lewis of Fair Haven, came near losing his life Sunday by drowning. He was floating on the water when a passerby saw him. It was several hours before he recovered consciousness and his condition is critical on account of the exposure.

The Sheffield Farms Milk company in Vergennes is building an addition to its milk plant, which will use in the making of milk sugar. Twelve men will be employed in that department when it is completed.

Hartwell Ward and Mr. Edwards of Shoreham left their automobile outside while they were attending a dance in Middlebury and when they came out it was missing. A deputy sheriff found the car ditched with a broken windshield and the cap to the radiator missing.

From a "thrift shop" (a variety of rummage sale), which the members of the Rutland Woman's club conducted in that city last week, the sum of \$993 was netted from the four days' sale. The entire stock of the "thrift shop" was donated.

A \$5000-farm in Vermont has been offered free and clear to some returned soldier, according to W. Stanwood Field, employment manager of the bureau for returning soldiers and sailors in Boston. An elderly couple made the offer. They describe the farm as consisting of 250 acres, free of encumbrance. The farm will keep 25 cows. The one condition attached to the offer is that the soldier who receives it must have had some experience and be physically able to carry on the work.

In reading old records regarding the early church life of the town of Barnet, the interesting fact was discovered that the first time that the sacrament of the Lord's supper was ever celebrated in Caldonia county was at Barnet Center Presbyterian church. It was not an unusual thing for 1,000 people to gather there on the sacrament day, four horse stages from Danville and Newbury in some instances bringing the newby.

Earl A. Bramas, who has been in the radio service at Camp Meade, Md., the last eight months, took up Monday the duties of supervisor of music in the public schools in Brattleboro, succeeding Charles Wood of Springfield, who left at Christmas time on account of ill health. Mr. Bramas was supervisor of music in Brantford two years, resigning eight months ago to enter the service and at that time was organist and choir master in Trinity Episcopal church in Shelburne. He is a graduate of the Grieg school of music in Rochester, N. Y., and attended the Leach school of music in New York. He is 27 years old, a native of Westport, N. Y., and unmarried.

BACK CRUSHED BY LOG.

Basil Bedard, Ryegate Lumber Worker, Died of Injuries.

St. Johnsbury, Feb. 19.—A three days' search for relatives of Basil Bedard, whose body is at the Caldwell undertaking rooms awaiting burial, has so far proved unavailing. The man died Saturday at Brightlook hospital from injuries received early in the week at Ryegate, where he was employed by the Parker Young Co. He was at work with a lumber crew and his back was crushed by a falling log. His injuries were so serious that he was unable to tell anything of his family. It is thought that he has a wife and child in Biddeford, Me., but his employers have been unable to locate them. The man was about 38 years old.

Send Resolution to Wilson with Endorsement of 14 Points.

Stockholm, Feb. 18.—A resolution formulated by the Swedish section of the international committee of women for permanent peace and endorsed by representatives of 47,000 Swedish women, declaring adherence to President Wilson's peace program, will be sent by I. Lester York, Roxbury Boy, in Germany and Has Been in Hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward E. York of Roxbury received the following letter from their son, Pvt. Lester E. York, Feb. 14, dated Jan. 17 and written from "Somewhere in Germany":

"Just a line to let you know that I am still in the hospital, but am feeling fine and the abscess under my left ear is getting along fine. I won't be in here much longer, then I will be shifted to a replacement camp and I can't tell you how long I will be there. Sometimes they keep them there for two or three weeks and sometimes longer.

"Well, we are still in Germany and have not heard anything about going home yet, but I hope it is before long.

"Say, Mother, I am spending the warmest winter that I ever spent, for here it is the middle of January and I have seen the ground white only one morning and that was Christmas morning.

"I had an awful surprise last night and you ought to have seen me. I was all ready to go to bed when the night orderly came into the ward with a package under his arm and wanted to know if there was a man in there by the name of Lester E. York. I jumped up and said 'Yes, sir,' but it was hard to make me believe it was for me, for I did not get a coupon to send you. Well, the first thing I did was to open it. I was as pleased as a little kid would be with a doll when I got it opened and saw what was in it. I was so pleased, for you don't know how it makes a boy feel to get a box from home. (It was a Christmas box sent Dec. 27 and he received it Jan. 16.) Everything was all right. I put the cake out of sight and you bet it tasted good, for it was the first I have had since I came over here. Then I went for the candy that Mons and Jesse sent, for we don't have much of that, and then I took to the peanuts and they sure tasted good, for there is another thing that you can't get over here, and I don't know who sent me the handkerchiefs, but that also came in handy, and you tell Aunt Lepha and Aunt Marcia that I was awfully pleased with those cigarettes and have got one in my mouth now. You tell them that I will never forget that package as long as I live. Also tell Aunt Lepha and all the rest of them that a new order has come out that you will have to put a five-cent stamp on your letters; if not, I will not get them. The A. E. F. has been putting the extra two cents on right along, but I saw by the paper the other night where they were not going to any longer. You may hear about it before you get this letter.

"I have not got any letters since September and that may be the reason."
