children to reside in February, 1890; 12 years after the first settlement in the township, and seven years after the town was organized.

He was an old-time blacksmith, a fine workman and mechanic. His place of business was located for a long time on a portion of the site of the frame store building situated on the westerly side of North Main street, owned by the testator at the time of his decease...

It was while Mr. Aldrich was speaking of his mother, however; and the manner in which he used to refer to her quiet demeanor, her deeply religious character, her large family, which she governed by love rather than fear...

Mr. Leonard Frost Aldrich was born in Barre on June 9, 1823; and was educated in the district and select schools of his native town and the academy in Newbury, Vt. After receiving his education, he was employed in the business of his father until he became 21 years of age.

He was there taught lessons of industry, economy, and integrity that were not forgotten. During the succeeding 10 years he was employed as clerk in one of the best known stores in Barre. The reputation established was such that he was selected manager of the "Union Store" (co-operative), which was located in the brick building, situated at the intersection of North Main and Washington streets...

stated in order the provisions he wished to make for those of kin to him. Those provisions were not afterwards materially changed, and little reference was made to them.

He wanted the attorney to prepare, and submit to him a plan whereby a trust be created; and the residue of his property, not disposed of as stated, go to a board of trustees; and that the vacancies in the board be filled by the surviving or remaining members.

The completion was soon reached that such a building as had been spoken of would cost at least thirty thousand dollars. He said there ought to be five thousand dollars spent for new books, and directed that thirty-five thousand dollars be inserted as a minimum sum that must be reached before the work was begun.

The unselfish manner in which he took the matter up is indicated, in a measure, by the fact that an offer was made by him to have his name used in connection with the trust or the library. No requirement was made that the beneficiaries or others contribute to the funds in order to make the property of his estate available.

Again, the matter of placing restrictions on the trust, and the duties of the trustees was fully considered; and it was decided that a proposition for him to forestall what course of action the remote future might necessitate to accomplish the best results. He wished as few restrictions as practicable inserted; and he wished it provided that nothing be received by the trustees from others on terms inconsistent with the provisions of his will.

One of the objects to be accomplished was to ascertain the cost of the buildings; and to be enabled to understand what grade of building could be constructed with the available funds then in their custody.

The Estate.

The property as decreed to the trustees, by the probate court, as per inventory and appraisal, was as follows: Bank building, corner N. Main and Washington Sts., Barre, City, \$12,000.00; Store building, westerly side Main St., Barre, City, 8,000.00; About 22 acres of wood land, Barre Town, 2,000.00; Four shares Pipe Stone County, Minn., school district bonds, 2,000.00; Four incorporated village of Fairmount, Minn., bonds, 4,000.00; Four town of Middle River, Minn., bonds, 2,000.00; Four town of Sioux Falls, S. D., bonds, 4,000.00; 20 shares Barre Savings Bank & Trust Co. stock, 2,000.00; 20 shares National bank of Barre stock, 2,000.00; East Montpelier creamery stock, 100.00; Cash, 289.47.

Total \$37,389.47. This inventory is exclusive of property the life estate in which was vested to those of kin to the testator. It is to be noted that the first item of \$13,000, not available for building purposes, but the net income from that building is to go towards the maintenance of the library; and \$5,000 of the total must be expended for the purchase of books.

In 1908 the trustees became incorporated by special act of the general assembly, as directed in the will. By unanimous vote the trustees took the corporate name: Aldrich public library.

On Oct. 8, 1908, the Barre Entertainment association paid to the treasurer of the Aldrich public library the sum of \$1,604.09 to be invested in interest-bearing securities; and "the income to be used by the trustees for the purchase of such newspapers, magazines, periodicals, and other publications of a similar nature which are appropriate for a well equipped reading and reference room."

On Jan. 23, 1907, the trustees had a conference with the architect, and the matter of a library building was fully considered. Thereupon it was voted that the architect be requested to revise his plans and specifications for a brick and granite building. They were revised; submitted to contractors, and sealed proposals solicited. Six proposals were received; and they were opened on March 12, 1907, the date fixed for such purpose.

the Barre Civic Federation of Women's Club saying that organization was considering the matter of procuring some gift for the library; and the result of such effort has been that the ladies have procured, and presented to the trustees, the portrait of Mr. Leonard Frost Aldrich, executed in oils by Mrs. Ruth Payne Burgess of New York, which now adorns the interior of the library.

On March 5, 1908, the trustees entered into a mutual arrangement with the directors of the French Barre library, whereby those books be placed in the Aldrich public library, and in the custody of architects be asked to submit plans for a library building in Barre.

On April 28, 1908, the city council of Barre passed a resolution transferring all of the books now owned by the city of Barre, and all that it may hereafter purchase, to the Aldrich public library, to be circulated within the city limits.

After the property had been decreed to them, the trustees ascertained there were two parcels of land in Minneapolis, Minn., the title to which was in Mr. Aldrich. There had been litigation involving the land during his disability, and probably without his personal knowledge. It was necessary to have his estate settled in Minnesota; and, to get the affairs in shape so the land could be sold, considerable expense was necessary in proportion to the value of the property; but it seemed there was something to be saved, and the matter was taken up by the trustees.

One parcel was sold in June, last, and it is probable the whole property will net the library \$1,900. The farm came to the trustees in May, 1908; and it was sold at public auction for \$10,800. No other contributions have been received except as stated; and the \$11,900 is all that has been received from the Aldrich estate, per inventory stated. The trustees placed \$5,000 to the book fund; they also have the Barre Entertainment association fund of \$1,004.09; and the bank building appraised at \$13,000, the income of which goes towards the maintenance of the library.

After paying the total cost of the building and improving the site, at \$40,350.02; the expense of cataloguing the books, supplies with which to keep up that work, insurance, coal for the coming winter, and all expenses to date, the trustees have available funds as follows: Four shares Pipe Stone County, Minn., school district bonds, \$2,000.00; Four incorporated village of Fairmount, Minn., bonds, 4,000.00; August E. Maire, mortgage note, 1,000.00; 20 shares Barre Savings Bank & Trust Co. stock, 2,000.00; 20 shares National bank of Barre stock, 2,000.00; Cash, interest deposit, 840.49.

Total \$11,840.49. It may be noted that the trustees have so administered the property of the estate, decreed to them at the value of \$19,389.47, on March 31, 1900, as to enable them to provide the library at the cost of \$46,350.02, dedicated on Sept. 22, 1908; and pay all the other expense incident thereto as stated. They received \$11,800 from other property of the Aldrich estate; but they had \$11,840.49 after the payments stated.
