"DIED OF ACCIDENT OR OTHER CAUSE"

The Major Casualty List Today Contained 239 Names

Washington, D. C., March 13.—Today's casualty list contained 239 names, divided as follows: Killed in action, 12; died of wounds, 13; died of accident or other cause, 30; died from airplane accident, 3; died of disease, 144; wounded severely, 35; missing in action, 2.

The following Vermont men were included: Died of Accident or Other Cause, Corp. Gordon G. Warren, St. Albans, Vt. Pvt. Raymond M. Dailey, W. Derby, Vt. A supplementary list contained 80 names, divided as follows: Wounded (degree undetermined), 47; wounded slightly, 33. There were no Vermont or New Hampshire men included.

SPEAKER CLARK DENIES PUBLISHED STORY

Did Not Declare League of Nations Had No More Chance of Ratification Than "You Have of Being Pope of Rome."

Atlanta, Ga., March 13.—Champ Clark, ex-speaker of the House of Representatives, in a signed statement given out here last night, denied that he had ever said the league of nations had no chance to be ratified by the United States Senate.

"Anybody who says that I said 'President Wilson's league of nations has as much chance of being ratified as you have of being pope of Rome,' is a malicious liar," the former speaker declared. "I have studiously avoided discussion in my lectures or interviews, though asked to do so in both. I gave as a reason that I was studying the subject and the arguments on both sides thoroughly.

"When the news came over to the House the last night of the session that 30 senators had signed a formal resolution against it, I said that the league of peace could not be ratified because it takes two-thirds to ratify—that is unless they changed their minds, because of amendments or for other reasons—all of which is a mathematical demonstration."

Mr. Clark's statement was made after hearing of statements published in a New York newspaper.

MANY TREES ORDERED.

About 500,000 Red Pine and Norway Spruce Ready for Spring Planting.

Orders are being gathered by the state forestry department for trees for spring planting. About 500,000 trees already have been called for and these are available from the state nurseries. The greater part of these trees are red pine and Norway spruce.

A co-operative agreement has recently been re-established with the United States government by the forestry department of Vermont whereby Vermont will receive assistance to the amount of about \$2,500, under the provisions of the Weeks law, for a part of the fire loss in the state.

FOREIGNERS IN BERLIN ORDERED TO REPORT

Former Rigid Rules Concerning Registration Which Were Wiped Out with the Revolution Have Been Restored.

Berlin, March 13.—Foreigners resident or staying temporarily in Berlin have been ordered again to report to the police.

When the revolution broke out the rigid rules concerning registration of aliens were summarily wiped out along with other police regulations for which Berlin was famous. The new freedom thus accorded visitors proved expensive for Germany, as it opened her frontiers to a promiscuous influx of foreigners, especially Russians, who showed themselves to be skillful in eluding the police dragnet which was thrown out in connection with the widespread bolshevik agitation.

Besides foreign political agitators, criminal elements from all parts of Germany were attracted to Berlin by the disorders which made the capital a lucrative field for their operations. The 10 weeks' administration of former Chief of Police Eichhorn served to wreck almost completely the efficient police organization for which Berlin was well known. The work of rehabilitating the system is proceeding slowly but with determination.

STATE GOES SHEEP-RAISING.

West Virginia Is Lending Encouragement to the Industry.

Charlestown, W. Va., March 13.—The state of West Virginia has decided to engage in the raising of sheep, in conjunction with A. E. Aegen and S. M. Croft of Grove City, Pa., and Charleston, and other business men of this state. James H. Stewart, state commissioner of agriculture, is authority for this announcement, claiming that his department is lending encouragement and financial assistance to the establishment of the greatest agricultural project ever attempted by a state. The ranch is to be located in Greenbrier county and will take in 18,121 acres.

F. M. Glenn, sheep expert of the department, is enthusiastic over the plan and says the ranch will be established in a narrow belt of West Virginia, which produces the finest fleeces in the world.

JACK JOHNSON "THREW" FIGHT

Claims He Allowed Jess Willard to Win as It Had Been Pre-arranged

NOW WANTS TO FIGHT FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

He Got Valuable Money Concessions, Johnson Declares

Havana, Cuba, Wednesday, March 12.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion, in a signed statement given to the Associated Press to-night declared that his fight with Jess Willard in this city four years ago was a pre-arranged affair and that he allowed Willard to win. In addition to the sum of \$30,000, entire rights to the moving picture films in Europe and 33 1/3 per cent of the proceeds from the exhibition in the United States and Canada are mentioned by Johnson, together with the promise of aid to settle Johnson's difficulties with the federal authorities in Chicago so that the colored pugilist might return there to reclaim his property and see his mother.

Johnson declared in his statement that it was arranged that he should lose in the 10th round, provided Willard's showing was such as to justify it, but that as Willard was doing practically nothing he was forced to wait. The signal agreed upon was given in the 20th, Johnson states, but he waited until the 24th round to give Willard an opportunity to make a good showing.

The former champion declares that unless Willard agrees to fight him within a reasonable time he will claim the world's title. He signed his statement: "Jack Johnson, Champion."

Colonel D'Estrampes, former congressman, who is backing Johnson, stated that Johnson is willing to battle Willard anywhere in the United States, the proceeds to go to Clark Griffith and Ball fund, or to any charitable institution on a reasonable time, which he should do to prove, if he can, that he beat me fairly. I shall claim the world's title."

FLOATING CANTEN DISMANTLED.

Passing of the Old Liner Borodino Will Cause Regret.

London, March 13 (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Crews of the American battleship squadron which formed one of the powerful outfits of the grand fleet that ruled the sea during the war will learn with regret of the dismantling of the old liner Borodino, the floating canteen for four years of the British navy, according to navy officials.

Her war work done, the Borodino now returns to the placid commerce of peacetime. How much the Borodino, admiring to the creature comforts of the fleet, did to relieve the strain of warfare and the monotony of life in the dreary regions of Scapa Flow, the Americans can testify. And they will recall how on returning from a sea mission the crew of a United States battleship took a special pride in cleaning up the Borodino, stripping its well-stocked counters of the last bun and the last pair of suspenders.

The Borodino was the first unofficial port of call of the warships on their return from the arduous cruises in the North sea. The smaller craft would lay themselves alongside the old liner while their crews went aboard. The larger ships would send their customers in small boats, or would receive visits from the "drifters" attached to the Borodino as delivery vans.

It was an extraordinary variety of purchases that the canteen ship offered. There were comestible comforts of every description, all sorts of dainty dishes to break the monotony of "bully beef" and biscuits; tobacco, cigarettes, books and candy.

That was only part of the stock. Visitors to the Borodino learned that the sailor has delicate tastes of another kind. Choice perfumes at \$9 a bottle, face cream and expensive toilet soaps constituted one of the most popular departments of the store.

The Borodino did not go to sea, of course, with the grand fleet, but she had her own adventures. Once on a trip from the Mersey she was hailed mysteriously by wireless: "What ship is that?"

"Borodino," replied the canteen ship innocently.

"Where are you bound?" was the next question. To everyone afloat except a U-boat commander the Borodino's name was her passport, and the inquiry put the vessel on the alert and she cleared out of those waters at full speed. The submarine, seeking the Borodino for its prey, was sunk. Some months later an officer visited the canteen ship and asked for discount on the ground that he was "the chap who sank that U-boat." He got it.

LONG AIR SERVICE PLANNED

From Cape to Cairo Undertaken by British Air Ministry.

London, March 13 (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Actual construction work already has begun in connection with the projected Cape to Cairo air service, the British air ministry announces. Aerodromes are being set up every 600 miles, the present non-stop limit, from one end of Africa to the other, the principal ones being built at Cairo, Khartoum and two in German East Africa, at Kampala and Uji.

The route then passes into Rhodesia and along the course of the railway to the cape. Long before the famous Cape to Cairo railway is in operation, it is confidently expected that airplanes will be covering the route on regular schedules. The distance is 3,200 miles.

They Were Men and Women Taken in Big Raid in New York

ONE OF SUSPECTS IS YOUNG WOMAN

Molly Steimer Was at Liberty Pending Appeal for Espionage Violation

New York, March 13.—All but four of the 160 men and two women who were taken to the criminal courts building early to-day, following a raid on a building in East Fifteenth street, were released after being questioned by immigration officials, police and secret service men. Those arrested were Molly Steimer, 21 years old, sentenced to 15 years' imprisonment for violation of the espionage act, but at liberty pending appeal to the supreme court; Marcus Ordowsky, 24, manager of "Bread and Freedom," a periodical; Peter Binanco, 27, secretary of the Russian Union of Peasant Workers of America, and Arthur Kelezes, 22, a printer. The four are charged with having in their possession literature advocating the overthrow of the government.

SUFFS ELECTED WINDSOR WOMAN

Dr. Marion Horton New President of Vermont Association.

The annual state convention of the Vermont Woman Suffrage association, which has been in session the past two days in the Hotel Sherwood in Burlington, closed yesterday. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National American Woman Suffrage association and also of the international alliance, was present and gave several talks before the members of the convention and also before the general public.

At the meeting Tuesday afternoon she spoke informally to the members of the state organization, telling them something of the national association. At a mass meeting in city hall in the evening she spoke convincingly on the subject "Finish the Fight." At the morning session in the hotel yesterday she outlined to the Vermont association the duty of the hour and at the luncheon at 12:30 she talked to the anti's.
