FOUR OTHER MEN SLIGHTLY HURT

Two New Hampshire Men Among the Minor Casualties

Washington, D. C., March 22.—Today's casualty list contained 219 names, divided as follows: Killed in action, 30; died of wounds, 26; died of disease, 99; died of accident or other cause, 53; wounded (degree undetermined), 4; missing in action, 7.

The following Vermont man was named: Died of Disease. Pvt. Arthur H. Landon, S. Hero, Vt.

Delaware Breakwater, Del., March 22.—The American liner Haverford, bringing 2,084 troops from France, passed in the Delaware capes early to-day. Among the troops are casualties from Pennsylvania. The liner is expected to dock at Philadelphia shortly after noon to-day.

Winnipeg, Man., March 21.—The big penny of Canada, for years the subject of mild controversy in the dominion, is at last to be replaced by a coin somewhat resembling the American cent in size and fitness.

The government announced, however, that the big cent would continue in circulation, which is somewhat of a compromise, as enemies of the giant penny wanted it melted out of existence. One of their chief arguments was that a person carrying 15 Canadian pennies soon became round-shouldered.

LAST BIG LOAN IN FIVE-YEAR NOTES

Secretary Glass Calls for Widest Distribution by Intensive Campaign in Victory Liberty Drive from April 21 to May 10.

The Liberty loan organization of New England, following the instructions of Carter Glass, secretary of the treasury, is completing arrangements and strengthening lines in every city and town in the six states for the Victory loan which opens Monday, April 21, and ends May 10.

Secretary Glass announces that this will be the last loan campaign undertaken by the government and that the same kind of intensive campaign for the widest possible distribution is the aim and need of the government.

The secretary says: "The new issue will be one of short term notes running not over five years, which will serve the interests of the United States at this time better than by the issuance of long term bonds which would have to bear the limited rate of interest of 4 1/2 per cent." The exact interest rate will be made known April 10.

The notes will be, as were the Liberty loan bonds, a direct promise to pay of the United States and will have interest coupons attached covering the entire life of the note. Secretary Glass expects the engraved notes will be ready for delivery April 21.

He says: "I am glad to adopt the plan issuing short term notes rather than long term bonds mainly because I believe a short term issue will maintain a price at about par after the campaign is over, more readily than would a longer term issue."

The treasury department will carry on the same intensive campaign distribution as heretofore. It will be unfortunate if the people fail to take these notes, placing the burden of subscription on the banks. The business of the country looks to the banks for credit to carry on its operations, and if that credit is absorbed largely by buying government securities, there will be many limitations in supplying credit for business purposes.

"I therefore ask the American people to give their support again to the government that this loan may be made an overwhelming success by the widest possible distribution."

DEVENS TO BECOME PERMANENT CAMP

War Department to Purchase Site of Cantonment for Military Purposes.

Washington, March 22.—Definite decision by the war department to purchase 15 cantonment sites for use as permanent military camps, was announced yesterday by Acting Secretary Crowell. He said that as a general policy, the so-called National Guard camps would be abandoned, with the exceptions of Camps Kearney, California, and Sevier, South Carolina.

The cantonments to be retained are Camps Bragg, Custer, Devens, Dix, Gordon, Dodge, Jackson, Knox, Meade Pike, Sherman, Taylor, and Upton.

COSSACKS TO SUPPLY FOOD

And to Observe Loyally All Decrees Regarding Food Supplies.

London, March 22.—The Cossacks of the Orenburg region have decided to supply Petrograd and Moscow with foodstuffs in large quantities and "to observe loyally all the decrees regarding food supplies," says a wireless report from Russia.

This decision was made at a formal conference at which the delegates agreed to organize soviets in all localities and to take steps against any attempts to a counter-revolution.

An elaborate program for the "socialistic organization of agriculture" was laid before the conference. A series of agricultural communes have been formed in the various districts and provinces. The council of the people's commissaries, the report stated, has assigned a credit of one billion rubles for the betterment of agriculture. The peasants are to be trained in scientific farming.

In order to supply the peasants with farming materials, the commissary has already organized construction and repair shops. In addition, measures have been taken for the sowing of 4,000,000 hectares of land not previously cultivated.

A NEUTRAL TRANSGRESSOR.

William Liebknecht, Son of the Spartacan Leader, Not Morally Guilty.

Berlin, March 22.—The Prussian minister of education has decided that William Liebknecht committed a "moral but not moral transgression" of the law when he aided the Spartacan forces in defending the Vorwarts building after that office was captured by the revolutionists. Young Liebknecht is a son of Karl Liebknecht, the Spartacan leader, who was killed in a conflict with government forces.

Parents of other youths had objected to permitting the Liebknecht boy to return to school, owing to his share in the Spartacan outbreaks. The minister of education asked these parents to withdraw their objections on the ground that the boy worshipped his father and had been for a long time subject to Spartacan influences.

A Number of Players Have Arrived in Philadelphia for the Preliminary Try-Outs.

Philadelphia, March 22.—Members of the Philadelphia Athletics who are going to do their spring training at Shibe park, are beginning to arrive at the grounds and are indulging in light practice. ORGANIZE A "TRY-OUT COURSE"

Some Cases of Disabled Soldiers Require Very Special Treatment.

Washington, D. C., March 22.—A large number of discharged disabled men of the army, navy and marine corps will need special investigation and study before adequate retraining courses can be recommended, according to the federal board for vocational education; and in many instances a continued course of therapeutic and other treatment is necessary to be continued during vocational instruction. Arrangements have been made by the federal board for "try-out" courses at some of the larger cities where the vocational work can be given, and where at the same time such expert supervision or treatment as the case may require may be had. Thus far arrangements have been made for the "try-outs" at Boston, New York, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Chicago and Minneapolis, with other centers under consideration.

The men who are assigned to the "try-out" courses will of course receive their \$65 per month for subsistence, allotments to dependents, and all expenses of special medical or orthopaedic treatment defrayed by the federal board. When the special difficulties have been overcome, the man has been gotten into best possible shape; the best course for him decided upon, and he is then started upon that course in some appropriate institution, or perhaps directly in the industry itself, and a place is ready for him upon completion of the course, provided by the placement division of the federal board, if it is a wage earning occupation for which the man has trained.

PETROGRAD MENACED?

By the Esthonian-Lettish Offensive Against Bolsheviki

TROTZKY ORDERS MOBILIZATION

All Men Up to 45 Years Are Said to Have Been Ordered Out

Paris, March 22 (Havas).—The Esthonian-Lettish offensive against the bolsheviki is menacing Petrograd so seriously that Leon Trotzky, the bolshevik minister of war and marine, has ordered the general mobilization of all men up to the age of 46, according to a Zurich dispatch to the Matin.

MILLERAND CHOSEN ALSACE GOVERNOR

Selection of Former Minister of War Meets with Approval Among French People.

Paris, March 22 (Havas).—Newspapers here comment most favorably on the appointment of Alexandre Millerand, former minister of war, as governor of Alsace-Lorraine. The Matin attaches particular significance to the appointment, pointing out that Premier Clemenceau and M. Millerand, "who have been divided by politics, have become reconciled."

PROHIBITS DYE IMPORTATION.

After the Declaration of Peace, King George Signs Proclamation.

London, March 22.—King George has signed a proclamation which prohibits the importation of dyes and dyestuffs after the declaration of peace, except under license granted by the board of trade.



PERSHING FULFILLED WISH Uttered by His Ancestors to Save Alsace-Lorraine.

Greensburg, Pa., March 22.—General John J. Pershing fulfilled the wish of an ancestor that a member of the Pershing family should save Alsace-Lorraine, when he led the victorious American armies against the Germans. This fact is disclosed by the Rev. Justus N. Pershing, a cousin of General Pershing, who has made public a letter written in Alsace-Lorraine more than 200 years ago by Frederick Pershing, General Pershing's great-great-grandfather. In this letter the general's ancestor expressed the hope that his son, Frederick Pershing, Jr., or his descendants "would come back some day and redeem the fair lands of Alsace-Lorraine from oppression."

According to the letter, the Pershings lived in the village of Kehe, in Alsace-Lorraine in 1744 and fought under Emperor Charles against the Magyars. Soon
