Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.

The distinguished service cross, awarded to Major H. Nelson Jackson of Burlington, was presented to him at Camp Upton recently.

An investigation into the ice situation in Burlington shows that only about 4,000 tons are in sight for domestic use until the next harvest.

Robert Woods revealed such bad burns about the legs from hot syrup while in the sugar orchard in Florence Monday that a doctor had to dress the burns.

The E. M. Wright estate in Orwell has offered to give the Clark residence there for a library and community house, with some money to help out on repairs.

In the section covered by the Rutland farm bureau over 1,000 pounds of meat were canned by the women the past winter for use during the summer. Of this, 228 quarts were canned in Brandon.

Francis Schank, 62, died at the town farm in Bennington Saturday evening. Mr. Schank, who was colored, was a well-known local character and had traveled throughout the country with several circuses.

Miss Laura B. Chase, an employe in the latch needle department of the Charles Cooper Estate in Bennington, had one hand caught under a press Monday and two fingers were taken off at the joints.

Mrs. Catherine A. Oney, who died at her home in Rutland Monday, was 77 years old, having been born in Sherburne. She is survived by five sons and two daughters, 15 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

G. Fred Jones of Burlington, a salesman, has filed a petition in bankruptcy in the office of the clerk of the United States court. He has liabilities of \$16,353.09, of which \$14,358.59 is unsecured. His assets are \$8,725.50.

Supr. A. W. Varney of the Bennington schools is to complete his duties in that position on July 1, after 17 years' service. He will continue in charge of the union district, including a number of rural schools. He went to Bennington 20 years ago as principal of the high school.

DEATH OF VERGENNES MAN.

N. J. McCuen, Who Had Been Active in State and City Life.

Nicholas J. McCuen, a prominent citizen of Vergennes, died Monday from the effects of a cerebral hemorrhage. Mr. McCuen was born in Ireland, but came to Vergennes at the age of six months. Before he was 13, he became a clerk in one of the Vergennes stores and retained that position until January, 1871, when at the age of 19 he purchased a stock of goods and went into business for himself. From this small beginning, he built up a large business, which for 30 years was one of the leading stores in Vergennes. He was a Republican in politics and had held many city offices. In 1878 he was chosen water commissioner, in 1880 was elected common councilman, was elected alderman, but resigned to give his whole time to his business and to his wife. In 1886 he was elected mayor of Vergennes and in 1888 was elected a representative to the legislature. He had been a member of the Republican city committee for 40 years. After retiring from business, Mr. McCuen was appointed assistant to the sergeant-at-arms of the United States Senate in Washington, D. C., for several years during the Roosevelt and Taft administrations. Since his return from Washington Mr. McCuen had been engaged in real estate dealings and the insurance business. For over forty years he had been a vestryman of St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal church in Vergennes and a warden of the church for 11 years. He belonged to many orders.

Wellman placed an attachment on Mrs. Bullock's farm property.
