MONTPELIER

Mr. and Mrs. George Bruno, whose house on Sibley avenue was raided last week, appeared in Montpelier city court Monday afternoon, each of them pleading guilty to the charge of illegal selling of intoxicating liquor. Each of them was sentenced to the house of correction for not less than six months and then placed on probation, having paid their cost of prosecution. One of the principal features of their probation is that no liquor shall be kept about the place. Malcolm Lamery, John Magne and John Gitchell of Montpelier appeared in Montpelier city court Monday afternoon as juveniles, each of them telling the same story that they told Chief Connolly last Saturday about the robbery of the Wheelock and Dawley store. Each of them was ordered committed to the industrial school for the rest of their minority. One of the peculiar features is that while they were each on probation when arrested they could not be taken for breach of probation because this robbery occurred before they were placed on probation a few months ago.

Michael Cohan of Boston is visiting W. H. Jeffrey, at his home he lived for a time in East Burke. He has been a bugler in the 26th division and was wounded in service, but is now able to get about with a cane. Although but 18 years of age, he was able to get into service. His injury was due to one of the big cannon running over his right leg. The cannon weighed 18 tons. The wheels were about eight inches wide with a groove in the center of the tread. Bugler Cohan had been knocked down and the wheel ran up his right leg to a little above the knee, where it turned and went off the leg, crushing the bone. It was refractured after set the first time. The regimental surgeon set it, but it came apart by rough carrying before he got back to the first aid hospital. It was reset and then as soon as he was able to travel he was sent to the house hospital at Tours. He had to ride on an English train. There are no air brakes on these and every time that the engineer stopped the train, it was with a sudden jerk that upset many patients. When the wounded reached Tours the bone was torn apart again and the fracture had to be reduced the third time. He is recovering from the injury in fine shape.

George Ladd, who has been visiting in St. Johnsbury, has arrived home. He reports that only about three inches of snow fell in that village last week.


