German "efficiency" would be a very much discredited factor, once that it had come up against a real problem of internal affairs.

Ed. Howe of Atchison admits that Vermont is practically as large as Ohio if "twere all rolled out flat. What Ed forgets is that those portions of Vermont that are set on edge in various angles of upheaval are what actually constitute the true charm of the state.—Rutland Herald.

For instance, the outcropping of granite in the upturned angles of the Barre ridge. So Ed Howe of Atchison should take cognizance that besides being as large as Ohio if rolled out flat, Vermont is immensely rich by reason of some of these angles turned up toward the heavens.

The return of President Thomas to Middlebury college after six months of service in welfare work in behalf of American soldiers in camp in the United States will, no doubt, be pleasing to students, alumni and friends of that institution. President Thomas' service at this time was matched by a somewhat similar service performed by him with the 1st Vermont regiment at the Mexican border in 1916, both services being rendered with a desire to be of practical aid in keeping up the morale of the troops who came within his influence. That work has come to be of very great importance, and the men and women who engage in it are most certainly contributing something toward the winning of battles for their armies. Welfare workers are almost as important as ammunition itself.

One of the most distressing after-war features threatens to be a bitter dispute among officers of the United States army because of some personal differences that arose at the height of the military campaigns and which resulted in displacement for the time being. Friends of some of these officers who claim that the officers were badly used threaten to start a discussion of such intensity and vigor as to make a second war seem almost inevitable right here at home—and the outcome of the whole thing will be that these people will talk and the other side will talk, then there will be some more talk and perhaps some investigation and we shall find ourselves just about where we started. It will amount to little—this discussion of personal grievances, of feuds between officers. Therefore, the friends of the officers who have grievances should desist from the effort to stir up the matter again. The public in general is not interested unless some vital principle is concerned.

BOOKS WANTED FROM BARRE.

As Many as 250 Is City's Quota for Soldiers' Use.

An urgent appeal for reading matter—both books and recent magazines—has been sent out from A. L. A. war service headquarters at Washington.

The half million men still in arms in France and Germany as well as those in the military hospitals on this side are calling for books. At no time, perhaps, has the need for wholesome entertainment and recreation been greater, for with the cessation of the business of fighting, the men are but marking time. And the flow of gift books and magazines has almost entirely stopped.

A. L. A. funds are reserved for the purchase of non-fiction, especially technical books, and with the educational plans now being carried out in the army, these funds are barely adequate. The lighter reading matter must be supplied by gift, and 600,000 volumes will be needed within the next three months. The nearest public library will forward your books, and the postoffice your stamped "Burlison" magazines.

Vermont has been asked to raise 5,000 books by May 1. If each one of 20 libraries will raise 250 volumes the quota will be met. Barre has always responded so generously for this cause, that we are sure that this time we will go over the desired quota. Leave your books at the Aldrich public library.
