Moreover, those in a position to know profess to believe that even outside of financial considerations at all, Alsace-Lorraine would prefer union with France rather than with Germany. So plebiscite or no plebiscite, it seems likely that the "lost provinces" will just naturally pass back into the hands of their former owner just as soon as the formal treaty is signed.

"HUMAN ERROR" CONVICTED.

Now that "human error" has been found by the interstate commerce commission to have been responsible for the collision on the New York Central railroad last January in which 21 lives were lost and several scores of people were injured, it behooves the railroads to take steps to eliminate this "human error" possibility if they are able. In this connection it is refreshing to note that mechanical equipment is not always to be made the "goat" of these railroad accidents and that the employees of the railroads are to be brought in for their share of the responsibility. There seems to be a change of idea from the former times when "human error" was not called into account very often for the untoward events that occur in operation of the railroads.
