**INVITATION WAS RECALLED**

Premier Lloyd George Had Invited Representative of Irish Societies

**BUT CHANGED MIND AFTER THEIR ACTIVITY**

In Going to Ireland and Participating in Movements There

London, Wednesday, May 14.—Andrew Bonar Law, government leader in the House of Commons, admitted to-day that Premier Lloyd George had asked Frank P. Walsh, Edward Dunne and Michael Ryan, representatives of Irish societies in the United States, to call on him, as he thought it would be to the advantage of Americans interested in Ireland to be received by him. He had planned to lay before them the British case and have it widely reported in America, where it is insufficiently understood, Mr. Bonar Law said.

The premier has withdrawn the invitation, the government leader said, because, while he is willing to receive Americans he is unwilling to receive those who "come to Ireland and not only take part in the politics of Ireland, but also in rebellious movements."
