It means that the people are going to work after their debauch of idleness and that the current of life is being taken up again. The outlook for the return of sanity there, as well as elsewhere, is very promising.

**THE SALVATION ARMY'S APPEAL.**

The Salvation Army proposes to do away with the "tombstone method" of collecting funds with which to carry on its work and will endeavor during the next few days to raise a fund of \$13,000,000 to be used all over the territory where the Salvation Army's work is applied. In order to raise this money a plan has been outlined much like that adopted by the war organizations during the time of the war, each community being asked to raise a certain sum through subscription of the people of the community. Barre will be asked next week to contribute its share along with the other cities and towns of the country, and, in view of the fact that the work of the Salvation Army is known to be effective, it is expected that the response will be generous from wide circles of people. You may be helping your church and some charitable organizations but you ought to lend some support to the activities of the Salvation Army.
