

# MINE DEATH LIST MOUNTS TO 83

Some of the 50 Others Injured May Not Be Able to Recover

SERIOUSLY BURNED AND MAIMED

State and Local Authorities at Wilkes-Barre Are Investigating

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., June 6.—State and local authorities to-day were conducting separate investigations into the explosion in a tunnel of the Delaware and Hudson Coal company yesterday that cost the lives of 83 men and the injury of 50 others. A large number of the injured were seriously burned and maimed and it is feared many of them cannot recover.

There was a difference of opinion as to the exact cause of the accident, which occurred while the men were on their way to work in a train of 14 mine cars drawn by an electric motor. In the middle of the train were two cars containing seven kegs of black powder. According to survivors the overhead trolley wire sagged when the train had penetrated the tunnel about 200 feet and touched a steel powder keg, forming a short circuit and setting off the powder. Officials of the company, after an investigation, expressed the opinion that a steel crow bar carried by one of the men came in contact with the wire, forming the short circuit, which caused the powder to blow up.

Early reports that the mine laws had been violated by carrying men and explosives on the same train were denied by Seward Button, chief of the state bureau of mines. Mr. Button said the state mine code contained no regulations on the transportation of explosives. He

## WILLARD WONT MEET NEGRO BOXING STARS

So His Trainers Are Hard Put to It to Get Persons Ready to Stand Up Under the Gruelling.

Toledo, June 6.—Sparring partners capable of handing out punishment instead of absorbing it is the paramount need in Jess Willard's training camp if the champion is to get hardened for his championship contest with Jack Dempsey here July 4, boxing experts declared to-day.

Willard can stand with his hands at his sides, if he so desires, and allow the present sparring partners in camp to drive blows at his jaw and stomach without apparent effect, but sporting experts said that was no indication that he could expose his vulnerable parts when Dempsey begins shooting his gloved fists at him. The challenger is a fighter of the Fitzsimmons type, with powerful forearms and terrific hitting power, and capable of stopping a foe with either hand.

Ray O. Archer, manager of the heavy-weight champ, is due in New York to-day to locate one and perhaps two sparring partners capable of trading wallops with Willard instead of being on the receiving end. Harry Willis, the giant negro heavyweight, is available but Willard will not tolerate a negro in camp because, after winning the championship from Jack Johnson, he established a color line.

Walter Monahan, a veteran in Willard's camp, is the chief sparring partner in service, but experts pointed out that he is not in condition to withstand Willard's attack, as he has been in the army for several months and has had no opportunity to condition himself for the gruelling work. Monahan was knocked out in the first go with the champion Wednesday.

Jack Dempsey is spending the last day of his "vacation" to-day. The challenger, already chafing under the restraint of idleness, will resume his conditioning grind at his Maumee Bay shore camp to-morrow.

## ORLANDO ABSENT FROM COUNCIL

When the Allies Met in Paris To-day for De-liberation

ADRIATIC QUESTION STILL NOT SOLVED

And No Further Progress Is Reported to Have Been Made

Paris, June 6.—When the council of four met this morning, Premier Orlando of Italy was absent. This led to the belief that the Adriatic question was again under consideration. It is understood that no further progress has been made by the various elements working on the solution of this problem.

## WILL MAKE DEMAND ON PRES. WILSON

That the Peace Conference Investigate the Irish Question—If Wilson Fails to Do So, He Will Go to the Italian Delegation.

Paris, June 6.—Frank P. Walsh, one of the delegates of the Irish societies in the United States, who visited Ireland recently, has presented a demand to President Wilson that the peace conference investigate the Irish question. His demand is accompanied by a 6,000-word report on observation made by Mr. Walsh and his colleagues, Michael J. Ryan and Edward F. Dunne, during their visit to Ireland.

In the event of Mr. Wilson's failure to push the matter, Mr. Walsh says he will present his request to the Italian delegates and, failing there, to the British colonies.

## SUES FOR BACK TAXES.

Town of Townshend Plaintiff Against Horace C. Howard Estate.

Brattleboro, June 6.—One of the interesting cases to come up at the next term of the Windham county court is the suit of the town of Townshend against the estate of the late Horace C. Howard, formerly of Townshend and Brattleboro, in which the town of Townshend seeks to recover \$100,000 claimed to be due in back taxes. The suit is brought by John H. Ware, town agent, through the office of Barber, Barber & Miller, and counsel for the estate are Harvey, Maurice & Whitney.

Mrs. Addie H. Howard Slack, sister of the late Mr. Howard and wife of Rev. E. A. Slack of Brookline, Mass., is the administratrix of the estate, and the legal papers were served on her.

Last March Mr. Ware presented the claim of the town of Townshend to the commissioners, H. P. Wellman and L. Guy Tasker, which was disallowed. The case was in the north probate district, the original guardian for Mr. Howard having been appointed in the probate court for that district, and Judge Warner A. Graham of the probate court in Bellows Falls allowed an appeal to the county court by Mr. Ware from the action of the commissioners in disallowing the claim.

Mr. Howard formerly lived in Townshend and his mother was appointed his guardian in that town. In 1887 Mrs. Howard and her children moved to Brattleboro and after a time Mr. Howard was committed to the Brattleboro retreat. He died nearly a year ago in Waverly, Mass. His estate was taxed in Brattleboro, and for many years before his death the estate was listed under the name of Ezra Slack, guardian, the latter being Rev. E. A. Slack, his brother-in-law. In recent years the estate was listed at \$140,000, but it is understood that the probate records show it to be over \$400,000.

## AMERICAN SOLDIERS CLASH WITH THE BELGIAN POLICE

Three Policemen and Two Civilians in Brussels Were Wounded—Three American Soldiers Placed Under Arrest.

Brussels, June 6.—American soldiers and the police at Antwerp clashed on Wednesday night. Three policemen and two civilians were wounded by shots that were fired during the melee. Three American soldiers, one of whom was wounded, were arrested.

## GOOD WOOL CLIP.

Taken from Sheep at Morgan Horse Farm in Middlebury.

Middlebury, June 6.—A large crop of wool has been clipped from the sheep on the Morgan horse farm of the department of agriculture. Seventeen yearling Southdown rams sheared on an average of eight and three-quarters pounds of wool each and 22 yearling ewes of the same breed sheared on an average of eight and a half pounds each. This, specialists, say, is a good performance for this breed. About 300 sheep, 80 of them pure bred, are maintained on the Middlebury farm for experimental purposes. G. M. Rommel and F. R. Marshall of the department of agriculture have gone to Du Bois, Idaho, to witness the shearing of 1,500 breeding ewes kept on the United States sheep experiment station, located there.

## SHIPYARD SHUT DOWN.

Baltimore Plant Has Been Employing 1,000 Men.

Baltimore, Md., June 6.—Having completed its government contracts, the shipyard of the Henry Smith and Sons company at Fairfield, has suspended construction and probably will shut down entirely in the near future. The yard has been employing about 1,000 men, but these were all laid off last week except 40, who are putting the finishing touches on the wooden ship Agibi, which was launched June 3. The launching of this vessel completed the government work of the yard.

## RIOT IN DUBLIN ON "CONNOLLY BIRTHDAY"

The gathering had been forbidden by the city authorities.

Goodspeed of the Congregational church of Barre, in Dewey hall at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon, followed by a guard mount at 5:15, evening parade at 5:30 and a band concert in the evening at 7:30.

Tuesday is undergraduate day and the program includes an exhibition of riding and a mounted field meet on Howard field at 10 a. m.; guard mounting at 5:15 p. m.; evening parade at 5:30 and moving pictures in Dewey hall at 8 o'clock.

Wednesday is alumni day, the program including a ball game between the alumni and Norwich at 10:30 a. m.; band concert at 2 p. m.; guard mounting at 5:15; evening parade at 5:30; fraternity house parties and alumni meeting at 8 o'clock.

Thursday is commencement day and opens with reception at 9 o'clock a. m., followed with the graduating exercises at 10 a. m.; escort to the standard; review; announcements of promotions and final review by the graduating class at 2 p. m., and closing with the commencement hop at 8 p. m.

## Legislators Consider Future of U. S. Training Service.

Washington, D. C., June 6.—Much of the discussion which is taking place on Capitol hill in Washington these days centers around the future of various activities which were created during the war to meet emergencies. The U. S. training service is one of the new branches of the department of labor which is seeking to a renewal of appropriation on the ground that there is a permanent need for its services.

It is contended that industrial training must become practically universal if American workers are to have adequate chance for self-improvement and if American goods are to successfully meet foreign competition. Recent reports received by the U. S. training service show that 350 concerns in this country, some of them employing many thousands men, have established training departments as a permanent feature in their plants. Experience during the war converted many of these firms to the need of this new feature in industrial management.

The task of this service has been to supply all interested manufacturers with especially prepared courses in training methods, so that competent instructors can have an approved guide in systematically teaching workers the best ways of doing their assigned operations.

## BOLSHEVIKI GAINED IMPORTANT VICTORY

Recaptured Sarapul, Which Was Taken by Admiral Kolchak's Forces in Their Spring Drive.

London, June 6.—The bolsheviki have recaptured Sarapul, on the Kama river southwest of Perm, which was one of the important towns taken by Admiral Kolchak's forces in their spring advance, a bolsheviki wireless message claims. The dispatch also asserted that the bolsheviki are continuing to advance in this region.

## Stockholm, June 6.—German forces on the Estonian front are said to be aiding the bolsheviki, in an official statement issued at Estonian headquarters.

"There was violent fighting on the Gatchina front throughout Tuesday and the battle was renewed on Wednesday. On the southern front, the German Landwehr, instead of pushing the enemy back from Riga, is trying by all means to advance to our line."

The movements of three cavalry detachments are specified in this connection in the report.

## Government Prepares Training Courses for Garment Makers.

Washington, D. C., June 4.—Specific recommendations by which the garment making industries of this country can be put on a more profitable basis are contained in four pamphlets being prepared by the U. S. training service of the department of labor. Experts employed by this service have been making an intensive study of the methods followed in these industries and have practically completed outlined courses for use in training old and new employes in four different lines; namely, making men's suits and overcoats, making women's cloaks, suits and skirts, making overalls and making shirts.
