Waterbury high school baseball team defeated Montpelier high school team on Montpelier seminary campus Wednesday afternoon by a score of 3 to 1. It was a good game, excepting for one inning, Waterbury having the best of the game all the way. Barrett was touched up freely by the Waterbury team. He succeeded in striking out only four men during the game but he kept the visitors from hitting them out of the infield.

Two nice double plays were pulled off. In the sixth inning Morse batted to Barrett, who threw to second, getting Lease and then Laird doubled to Smith at first, getting Morse out. In the eighth inning Barrett batted to Gilmore, who threw to first, doubling up Lamperti, who was almost at second when the play commenced.

M. Comi split a finger in the fourth inning but caught the rest of the game. Montpelier obtained its single score in the second inning. Smith went to first on Gilmore's error. Lavolette struck out. Donnelly was hit by a pitched ball and then M. Comi drove out a double, scoring Smith and leaving Donnelly on third. The next two men were easy outs.

Waterbury obtained its first score in the first inning. Gray singled. Gilmore sacrificed him to second, Randall and Clerici singled, scoring Gray. Waterbury got its two other scores in the third inning. The first two men up were easy outs. Then Clerici, on A. Comi's error, landed on first. Powers advanced him and Lease singled, scoring both of the men, although the last one was on a poor judgment in relaying the ball to the field. THREATENS SUIT
AGAINST DEMPSEY

John J. Reiser Claims \$10,000 Due Him from the Challenger of Willard—The Prize Fighters Already Are Reaping a Rich Harvest.

Toledo, Ohio, June 12.—John J. Reiser, known to the boxing fraternity as "John the Barber," formerly manager of Jack Dempsey, has threatened to bring suit here in an attempt to restrain Dempsey from fighting Jess Willard unless he is paid \$10,000. Reiser claims this is due him out of the \$27,500 the challenger is to receive for boxing Willard. Reiser made known his demands to Tex Rickard.

Jack Kurna, manager of Dempsey, said he had taken proper legal action to protect Dempsey's interests. Ray J. Cannon, an attorney of Milwaukee, who has opposed several suits filed by Reiser in an attempt to regain the management of Dempsey, is coming here.

Willard and Dempsey are reaping a rich harvest as a result of the big crowds which continue to pay to visit their training camps on the shores of Maumee Bay. A crowd of 700 to 1,000 persons can be counted upon with regularity on week days and the attendance at the rival camps on Sundays usually reaches the 2,000 mark.
