### WEATHER FORECASTS AID FLIERS.

Helped the U. S. Naval Seaplane Crews in Trans-Atlantic Flight.

Recalling its part in the historic and successful trans-Atlantic flight by an American seaplane, the weather bureau of the United States department of agriculture reiterates its belief that not until improvements in aircraft have rendered them more independent of weather conditions than they now are, will trans-oceanic flying be at all practicable—at any rate, on anything like a regular schedule. The bureau meteorologists, however, express little doubt that such improvements will be made, and that within a few years flying across the seas will no longer be looked upon as an adventure, but rather as a necessary feature of the world's daily routine.

Weather reports, since the trans-Atlantic flight was made, show that at no time since have conditions been so favorable as when the NC planes left Newfoundland. In general, according to the meteorologists, occasions are rare in which ideal conditions would be experienced over as long a course as that upon which the navy fliers set out.

The weather bureau actively co-operated with the United States navy in the successful attempt to cross the Atlantic ocean in seaplanes. Arrangements were made for the receipt of meteorological observations from Europe and the Azores and, in addition, regular observations were made on ships at sea, under the direction of the naval meteorological service. All of these observations, together with those regularly taken in the United States and Canada, were reported by radio four times daily to the central office of the weather bureau at Washington, D. C., and to the base ship Astorbrook at Trepassey, N. F. At the latter place these reports were charted and studied by a representative of the weather bureau and by a member of the naval meteorological service, and statements, based upon this study and indicating the current and probable future conditions, were given to the commanders of the seaplanes.

On the historic 16th of May, these statements showed that conditions for the flight from Newfoundland to the Azores, although not perfect, were the most favorable they had yet been, and

Commander Towers was accordingly advised to have everything ready for the start, providing the forecast from Washington was favorable. About an hour later this forecast was received. It also advised that the flight be made that day, but pointed out, as did the statement made at Trepassey, that cloudiness would be encountered near the Azores. The Trepassey statement included a table showing the wind assistance that would probably be received at successive points along the route. As is well known, the flight was started on that day, and one of the seaplanes, the NC-4, reached the Azores without mishap and ahead of schedule time. As had been predicted, weather conditions were excellent over the western part of the course, but cloudiness interfered with navigation to some extent near the Azores.
